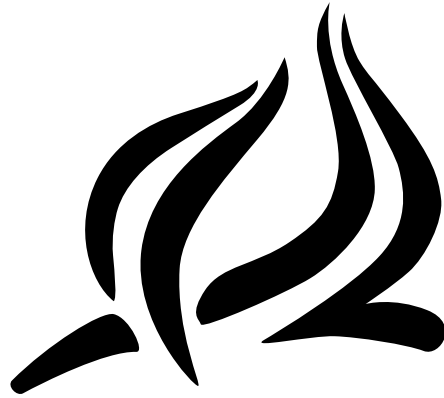

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# DEPARTMENTAL EXHIBITORS RULES AND REGULATIONS

The general supervision of the entire Puyallup Fair and Spring Fair in Puyallup, including all exhibits, entertainment and concessions, has been vested by the Western Washington Fair Association board of directors in the Chief Executive Officer of the Association.

1. The Association will have officers on the grounds and will use every reasonable precaution in its power for the preservation and protection of persons, articles on exhibition, entries, livestock and property, but will not be responsible for loss or damage by theft, fire or otherwise.

## TRADEMARKS AND COPYRIGHTS

2. Certain words, slogans and graphic symbols have been established to represent the Puyallup Fair and the Spring Fair in Puyallup, and are the exclusive property of the Western Washington Fair Association. "The Spring Fair in Puyallup" and "The Puyallup Fair" are trade names registered with Washington's Secretary of State. Artwork, slogans, music and other communications created to promote or represent the Association or its annual fairs are likewise protected by law. This includes the phrase "Do the Puyallup" and the music and lyrics of the song, "Do the Puyallup," the wordmark combining "THE SPRING FAIR IN PUYALLUP" and "THE PUYALLUP FAIR" and other temporary slogans such as "It's Spring, Baby!", "Epic Fun" or "I Love This Fair."

The valuable trade names and protected slogans and symbols may not be used without the express written consent of the Fair. In general, permission is granted under license, i.e., for consideration, or by permission under special circumstances. Submit requests to the marketing manager, along with complete information on frequency and distribution, including examples or written description of the proposed use.

WHEN ADDRESSING CORRESPONDENCE TO THE FAIR, PLEASE NOTE DEPARTMENT TO WHICH IT BELONGS ON THE FACE OF THE ENVELOPE.

3. Exhibitors should check each department for specific entry information. Read the special rules and other information printed in connection with the classification and prize list in each department. Note the time set for the closing of entries.
4. Every animal or article must be entered in the name of the owner, maker or grower.  
  
ANYONE TRYING TO DECEIVE THE COMMITTEE WITH REGARD TO OWNERSHIP OF EXHIBIT, OR WHO SHALL PURCHASE OR BORROW THEM AND EXHIBIT THEM AS OF HIS OR HER OWN MANUFACTURE OR PRODUCTION, SHALL FORFEIT ALL CLAIMS AS AN EXHIBITOR.
5. No "FOR SALE" cards will be allowed on exhibits, in the buildings, or on the grounds.
6. Fair management reserves the right to cancel any class without prior notice for reasons deemed advisable by Fair legal counsel and/or Fair veterinarian.

## ARRIVAL TIME OF EXHIBITS

7. The Puyallup Fair will be open for the receiving of articles according to the specified rules governing individual departments.
8. EXHIBITS MUST BE IN PLACE AT 8:00 A.M. THE FIRST DAY OF THE FAIR UNLESS OTHERWISE NOTED. CHECK EACH DEPARTMENT'S ENTRY INFORMATION FOR POSSIBLE EXCEPTIONS.

## PREMIUMS AND AWARDS

9. First premiums shall be designated by blue ribbons, second premiums by red ribbons, third premiums by white ribbons, fourth premiums by pink ribbons, and fifth premiums by yellow ribbons.

10. No animal or article shall be allowed to compete for more than one open class premium, nor shall it be entered in more than one class, except as one of a herd, pair or pen, fur or wool, get of sire or dam, or in sweepstakes or championship classes. However, 4-H and FFA exhibitors may also show their registered livestock in open classes, provided their entries are received by the closing date for entries in the open class, and providing there is no conflict in judging schedule with the junior show.
  11. No animal or article shall be removed from the Fair before the close of the Fair or show, except by special permission from the superintendent. Any animal or article taken away before the close of the Fair or show without the permission of the superintendent shall forfeit all premiums. LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS: SEE RULES IN REGARD TO SPLIT SHOWS UNDER SPECIFIC DEPARTMENTS.
  12. Unless otherwise stated by a specific department, in cases where exhibits are tied for prizes, awards shall be determined as follows:
    - A. If the premium is a trophy, medal or any other award except a cash prize, the exhibitors entering these exhibits shall draw lots, the winner being awarded the premium.
    - B. If the premium is a cash prize, the money shall be divided equally among the exhibitors concerned. The next lower cash premium, if any, offered in the class shall be added to the premium for which the entries are tied, and then the division shall be made equally.
  13. Cash prizes shall be paid to winners only in classes included in the judge's list.
  14. The judges shall report only the animals or articles entitled to premiums in the judge's list, though they may commend others they deem worthy. The superintendent may deny entry to any animal or exhibit he deems unworthy of public display.
  15. No animal or article deemed unworthy shall be awarded a premium. No premiums shall be withheld merely because there is no competition. Decision of the judge shall be final.
  16. No person shall be allowed to see the judging books until after the awards have been made and entered.
- interest in the result as owner or agent; and when awards have been made in violation of this rule Fair management reserves the right to appoint a new judge and to compel another examination.
18. Any person interfering with the judge during the adjudication of awards will forfeit the right of premiums. All officers or judges are required, and exhibitors are requested, to report any violation of this rule to the department superintendent.
  19. All protests must be made in writing, and must be accompanied by a deposit of \$25.00, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal, and must be filed with the Puyallup Fair Entry Office within 24 hours after the cause of protest.
  20. NO PERSON SHALL BE ALLOWED TO SELL OR GIVE AWAY ARTICLES ON THE GROUNDS, EITHER DURING THE FAIR OR AT ANY TIME BEFORE THE COMMENCEMENT OF THE SAME, UNTIL THE LICENSE FOR THE PRIVILEGE SHALL HAVE BEEN PAID AND RECEIPT THEREFORE ISSUED. THIS INCLUDES BALLOONS OR OTHER NOVELTIES FOR WHICH THE FAIR CONTRACTS THE SALE PRIVILEGE.

### **PERSONALITY RIGHTS**

Exhibitor hereby grants to Western Washington Fair Association ("WWFA") the irrevocable, assignable, worldwide right and license to use, alter and publish his/her image, alone or together with other images and text, for WWFA publications and for all other purposes reasonably related to promotion of WWFA, the Spring Fair in Puyallup and Puyallup Fair, in any manner and in any medium now known or later developed, without the need for exhibitor's prior approval. This right and license will govern all images of exhibitor, whether created before or after the date of these Rules and Regulations, unless exhibitor notifies WWFA in writing that of a desire to exclude specific images from this right and license. Exhibitor hereby releases the photographer and/or videographer and WWFA, its agents and assigns, from all claims and liability relating to the licenses that exhibitor has granted in this license and release. This license and release will not obligate WWFA to use or publish exhibitor's image or use the rights exhibitor has granted.

### **ELECTRICAL USAGE NOTICE**

Electrical appliances which draw more than 200 watts and which are used for the personal convenience of exhibitors (kettles, coffee pots, space heaters, air conditioners, hot plates, etc.) are not allowed without permission. A costly power failure can result from overloading circuits.

**NO COOKING OR EATING IS ALLOWED IN THE BARN.**

### **PENALTIES AND PROTESTS**

17. Fair management will appoint a superintendent and one or more judges for each division when deemed necessary. No person can act as a judge in any division or class in which there is any direct or indirect

# VEHICLE UNLOADING PROCEDURES

The Puyallup Fair is continually striving to make setup of merchandise and animal exhibits safer and more efficient. We are asking for your full cooperation in this safety program. **If you do not need to drive onto the grounds, please park in a Fair parking lot and hand truck or walk in.** When you have to drive in and unload, do so as quickly as possible and exit.

## Security Check

Each vehicle entering the grounds will be subject to search prior to entering the grounds. Please enter designated Security Checkpoint Staging Area located at the Service Gate area. Expect delays.

## Service Gate

Enter to receive vehicle permit to unload on grounds. You will be allowed one hour to unload and exit the grounds. Your pass will be date/time stamped. If you absolutely cannot complete your unloading in one hour, you must get the pass validated by a department superintendent or an administrative person.

## Traffic Pattern

Follow the traffic patterns as established. Surrender the vehicle permit at the time you exit the grounds.

## Fine

If you take longer than one hour and do not have validation for an extension, there is a parking fine of \$10.00 per hour.

## During Fair Time

Concessionaires and sponsors with vehicles will be allowed through the Service Gate between 6:00 am and 8:30 am with a Service Road Vehicle Permit. You will receive your gate permit from the attendant at the gate. **NO** vehicles are allowed through the gate after 8:30 am. All vehicles must be removed from the grounds by 9:00 am. Vehicles left unattended and without a permit for parking past the allotted time will either receive a warning and be asked to remove the vehicle from the grounds or be towed away at the owner's expense. Do not park in front of doorways or in vehicle traffic lanes. Your vehicle may be towed away. **HANG VEHICLE PERMIT ON THE REAR VIEW MIRROR SO YOU CAN BE FOUND IN AN EMERGENCY. Include the building where you can be located and your cell phone number.** Please unload quickly and remove your vehicle from the grounds. **NO KEYS ARE TO BE LEFT IN MOTORIZED VEHICLES ON DISPLAY.**

**The Camp Fire Department's exhibit is located in the Pavilion, first floor (#17 on map).**

- No entry fee will be charged, and no passes will be given to exhibitors.
- Each entry will receive a ribbon. There is no money or other premium awarded. Entries are judged first, second, third and fourth place.
- A sweepstakes rosette is given to the entrant with the most blue ribbons in a variety of categories, in at least five different divisions. Only two entries in each item number.
- Runner-up ribbons will be awarded based on the highest number of blue ribbons won.
- A Best in Category ribbon will be awarded in each Division.

## RULES FOR ENTERING

1. Entries in this department are open to all registered Camp Fire members through 12th grade. Preschoolers may enter five items each. Kindergarten, first and second grades may enter 10 items each. Third through 12th grades may enter 20 items. Articles entered must never have been entered before at this Fair in the Camp Fire Division.
2. Each article must have a tag with the individual's name, age, current grade, council, service area, leader's name, name of article and entry number from this class list. This tag will be removed before judging. All entries must be listed on the entry form. Entry tags and entry form (see pages 11 and 12 in this book) may be reproduced. One child per entry form, please.
3. Entries must be neat, clean and represent the entrant's OWN best efforts. For best judging results, items should be made within the last year.
4. Each entry must be able to be displayed properly. If the entry is small, fragile or loose, it must be fastened to a stable base or mounted. Do not use entry tag as a base for small items. The base or mounting should not distract from the entry, and the overall appearance will be considered in the judging. Any additional information or explanations for the judges, or information to be put on the display should be noted on a separate piece of paper, NOT ON THE ENTRY FORM OR TAG.
5. Check the rules pertaining to each division. Failure to comply with the rules will disqualify or count against the entry. Decision of the judges is final.
6. Entries from all Camp Fire members may be brought to the Camp Fire Exhibit in the Pavilion at the Puyallup Fair by each individual or by each leader. Or, check with your local service area office to see if they transport entries. Be sure to designate who will be responsible for picking up the entries at the Fair.
7. RECEIVING DATES—For all entries except baked goods: Wednesday, September 2, 9 am to 4 pm.  
BAKED GOODS—Wednesday, September 9, 9 am to 2 pm. No entries will be accepted after deadline. Enter through Service Gate (on 5th Street SW, off 15th Avenue SW). All vehicles entering grounds may be subject to search. Expect delays.
8. Entries MUST be removed on Tuesday, September 29 ONLY, from 11:00 am to 4:30 pm.
9. DISPLAYS—Ceremonial gowns and vests, and any item that does not qualify to be judged. All displays must be tagged and included on an entry form.

# DEMONSTRATIONS

Clubs may sign up to volunteer to do demonstrations at the Camp Fire site at the Fair. You can sign up for 1/2-hour to one-hour time slots with Loretta or Jenny (see page 4 for phone numbers) or e-mail [cffair@comcast.net](mailto:cffair@comcast.net) until the start of the Fair (September 11.) After that, you may contact the Camp Fire staff at the Puyallup Fair at (253) 841-5207.

Time slots are usually between 4 pm and 6 pm on weekdays, and 10 am and 6 pm on weekends. We can schedule during the day on weekdays if your club's school has a day off during the Fair.

Your demonstration may be any activity that welcomes the public to participate or observe, and walk away with a small souvenir or a good feeling. No fee may be charged.

You will be mailed tickets for your group members and adult volunteers to enter the Fair.

## DIVISION A

### CULINARY ARTS

#### BAKING

Baked goods must be fresh baked, placed on a paper plate, and the recipe attached to the plate. Entries will be judged on texture, flavor, appearance and aroma. If the entry is covered, care must be taken that the wrapping does not disturb the appearance. Each cake entry must be made from a different flavored recipe or mix. Members of the same family MUST use a different recipe or mix for each entry. Recipes using alcohol may not be used. Baked goods are not returned. If you want the decorated cake tops or candy returned, please specify on the entry form. No items will be accepted that need refrigeration.

- 2500. 1/4 of a cake from a recipe, no frosting

- 2503. 3 cupcakes from a recipe, frosted
- 2504. 1/2 loaf of quick bread (no mix)
- 2505. 1/2 loaf of yeast bread (no mix)

#### CLASS

- 2507. 4 cookies (no mix)
- 2508. 4 pieces of candy (no molded candy)
- 2509. Pie in a 4" or 6" foil pan or 1/4 of a 9" pie (no cream or soft fillings)

#### PRESERVING

All canned entries must be in standard canning jars with canning lids, following USDA recommendations. Screw bands must be removed and jar must be clean, with a label indicating processing method, time, variety and date. Also, indicate on the label if no sugar was used. Labels must be neatly and permanently attached. They are not part of the entry tag. Canning will be judged for appearance, container, label and pack.

All jellies, jams, conserves, etc. must be in standard canning jars with lids or jelly glasses. ONLY jelly may be sealed with a thin layer of paraffin and a metal lid. All jams, conserves, etc. must be sealed with canning lids. Each jar must have a label indicating method, variety and date. They will be judged for containers, label, appearance and color. NO frozen jam or jelly.

Dried foods must be in a small plastic bag, and the bag attached to a paper plate. Attach a label to the plate indicating method, variety and date. They will be judged for appearance, proper preparation and packaging.

## DIVISION B

### HOME ARTS

#### HOMEMAKING

Each article must be properly prepared for display and will be judged for neatness, challenge and originality.

#### SEWING

All articles must be clean and completely finished. Very small items should be mounted (not on entry tag.) Sewing will be judged for selection of design, fabric, purpose of garment, workmanship, and general appearance.

## HANDCRAFTS

Handcraft items should use the entry number according to the kind of material which constitutes the major portion of the item to be judged. An article may be entered under one number only, and is eligible to receive one ribbon. All entries must be clean. Very small items must be securely fastened to a stable base or neatly mounted (not on entry tag), so they may be properly displayed.

One-of-a-kind, sets or pairs will be judged as one. They will be judged for neatness, originality, effort, and quality.

Articles must be neatly mounted or in a folder. There should be no grades or comments on them by a teacher. All work must be done by the entrant. They will be judged for originality, form, structure and neatness. **MUST BE ORIGINAL.**

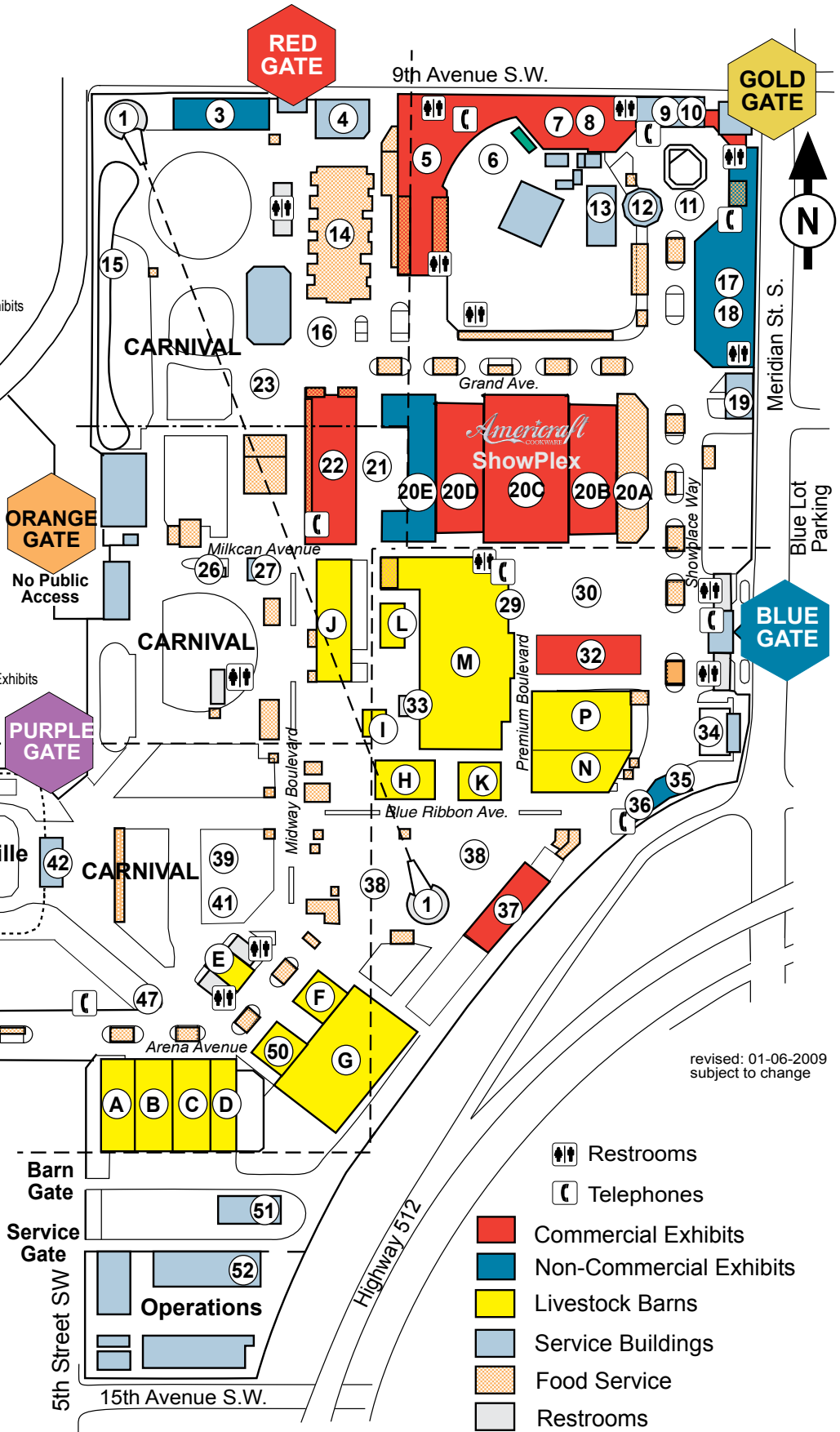
