DEPARTMENTAL EXHIBITORS RULES AND REGULATIONS

The general supervision of the entire Puyallup Fair, including all exhibits, entertainment and concessions, has been vested in the manager of the Association by the Western Washington Fair board of directors.

1. The Association will have officers on the grounds and will use every reasonable precaution in its power for the preservation and protection of persons, articles on exhibition, livestock and property; but will not be responsible for loss or damage by theft, fire or otherwise.

TRADEMARKS AND COPYRIGHTS

2. Certain words, slogans and graphic symbols have been established to represent the Puyallup Fair, and are the exclusive property of the Western Washington Fair Association. "The Puyallup Fair" is a trade name registered with Washington's Secretary of State. Artwork, slogans, music and other communications created to promote or represent the Association or its annual fairs are likewise protected by law. This includes the phrase "Do the Puyallup" and the music and lyrics of the song, "Do the Puyallup," the wordmark combining "THE PUYALLUP FAIR" with or without cow heads and other temporary slogans such as "Epic Fun," "I Love This Fair" or "Come Together".

The valuable trade names and protected slogans and symbols may not be used without the express written consent of the Fair. In general, permission is granted under license, i.e., for consideration, or by permission under special circumstances. Submit requests to the marketing manager, along with complete information on frequency and distribution, including examples or written description of the proposed use.

3. EXHIBITS MUST BE IN PLACE AT 8:00 A.M. THE FIRST DAY OF THE FAIR. CHECK EACH DEPARTMENT FOR POSSIBLE EXCEPTIONS.
4. The Western Washington Fair Association assumes no responsibility for loss or damage to entries. Every reasonable precaution will be used to protect items on display.

WHEN ADDRESSING CORRESPONDENCE TO THE FAIR, PLEASE NOTE DEPARTMENT TO WHICH IT BELONGS ON THE FACE OF THE ENVELOPE.

Read the special rules and other information printed in connection with the classification and prize list in each department. Note the time set for the closing of entries.

6. Every animal or article must be entered in the name of the owner, maker or grower.

ANYONE TRYING TO DECEIVE THE COMMITTEE WITH REGARD TO OWNERSHIP OF EXHIBIT, OR WHO SHALL PURCHASE OR BORROW THEM AND EXHIBIT THEM AS OF HIS OR HER OWN MANUFACTURE OR PRODUCTION, SHALL FORFEIT ALL CLAIMS AS AN EXHIBITOR.

7. No "FOR SALE" cards will be allowed on exhibits, in the buildings, or on the grounds.
8. Fair management reserves the right to cancel any class without prior notice for reasons deemed advisable by Fair legal counsel and/or Fair veterinarian.

ARRIVAL TIME OF EXHIBITS

9. The Puyallup Fair will be open for the receiving of articles according to the specified rules governing individual departments.

PREMIUMS AND AWARDS

10. First premiums shall be designated by blue ribbons, second premiums by red ribbons, third premiums by white ribbons, fourth premiums by pink ribbons, and fifth premiums by yellow ribbons.
11. No animal or article shall be allowed to compete for more than one open class premium, nor shall it be entered in more than one class, except as one of a herd, pair or pen, fur or wool, get of sire or dam, or in sweepstakes or championship classes. However, 4-H and FFA exhibitors may also show their registered livestock in open classes provided their entries are received by the closing date for entries in the open class, and providing there is no conflict in judging schedule with the junior show.
12. No animal or article shall be removed from the Fair before the close of the Fair except by special permission from the manager. Any animal or article taken away before the close of the Fair, without the permission of the manager, shall forfeit all premiums. **LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS: SEE RULES IN REGARD TO SPLIT SHOWS UNDER SPECIFIC DEPARTMENTS.**
13. Unless otherwise stated by a specific department, in cases where exhibits are tied for prizes, awards shall be determined as follows:
 - A. If the premium is a trophy, medal or any other award except a cash prize, the exhibitors entering these exhibits shall draw lots, the winner being awarded the premium.
 - B. If the premium is a cash prize, the money shall be divided equally among the exhibitors concerned. The next lower cash premium, if any, offered in the class shall be added to the premium for which the entries are tied and then the division shall be made equally.
14. Cash prizes shall be paid to winners only in classes included in the judge's list.
15. The judges shall report only the animals or articles entitled to premiums in the judge's list, though they may commend others they deem

worthy. The superintendent may deny entry to any animal or exhibit he deems unworthy of public display.

16. No animal or article deemed unworthy shall be awarded a premium. No premiums shall be withheld merely because there is no competition. Decision of the judge shall be final.
17. No person shall be allowed to see the judging books until after the awards have been made and entered.

PENALTIES AND PROTESTS

18. The manager will appoint a superintendent and one or more judges for each division when deemed necessary. No person can act as a judge in any division or class in which there is any direct or indirect interest in the result as owner or agent; and when awards have been made in violation of this rule the manager reserves the right to appoint a new judge and to compel another examination.
19. Any person interfering with the judge during the adjudication of awards will forfeit the right of premiums. All officers or judges are required, and exhibitors are requested, to report any violation of this rule to the manager of the Puyallup Fair.
20. All protests must be made in writing, and must be accompanied by a deposit of \$25.00, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal, and must be filed with the manager within 24 hours after the cause of protest.
21. **NO PERSON SHALL BE ALLOWED TO SELL OR GIVE AWAY ARTICLES ON THE GROUNDS, EITHER DURING THE FAIR OR AT ANY TIME BEFORE THE COMMENCEMENT OF THE SAME, UNTIL THE LICENSE FOR THE PRIVILEGE SHALL HAVE BEEN PAID AND RECEIPT THEREFORE ISSUED. THIS INCLUDES BALLOONS OR OTHER NOVELTIES FOR WHICH THE FAIR CONTRACTS THE SALE PRIVILEGE.**

ELECTRICAL USAGE NOTICE

Electrical appliances which draw more than 200 watts and which are used for the personal convenience of exhibitors (kettles, coffee pots, space heaters, air conditioners, hot plates, etc.) are not allowed without permission. A costly power failure can result from overloading circuits.

VEHICLE UNLOADING PROCEDURES

The Puyallup Fair is continually striving to make setup of merchandise and animal exhibits safer and more efficient. We are asking for your full cooperation in this safety program. **If you do not need to drive onto the grounds, please park in a Fair parking lot and hand truck or walk in.** When you have to drive in and unload, do so as quickly as possible and exit.

Security Check

Each vehicle entering the grounds will be subject to search prior to entering the grounds. Please enter designated Security Checkpoint Staging Area located at the Service Gate area. Expect delays.

Service Gate

Enter to receive vehicle permit to unload on grounds. You will be allowed one hour to unload and exit the grounds. Your pass will be date/time stamped. If you absolutely cannot complete your unloading in one hour, you must get the pass validated by a department superintendent or an administrative person.

Traffic Pattern

Follow the traffic patterns as established. Surrender the vehicle permit at the time you exit the grounds.

Fine

If you take longer than one hour and do not have validation for an extension, there is a parking fine of \$10.00 per hour.

During Fair Time

Concessionaires and sponsors with vehicles will be allowed through the Service Gate between 6:00 am and 8:30 am with a Service Road Vehicle Permit. You will receive your gate permit from the attendant at the gate. **NO** vehicles are allowed through the gate after 8:30 am. All vehicles must be removed from the grounds by 9:00 am. Vehicles left unattended and without a permit for parking past the allotted time will either receive a warning and be asked to remove the vehicle from the grounds or be towed away at the owner's expense. Do not park in front of doorways or in vehicle traffic lanes. Your vehicle may be towed away. **HANG VEHICLE PERMIT ON THE REAR VIEW MIRROR SO YOU CAN BE FOUND IN AN EMERGENCY. Include the building where you can be located and your cell phone number.** Please unload quickly and remove your vehicle from the grounds. **NO KEYS ARE TO BE LEFT IN MOTORIZED VEHICLES ON DISPLAY.**

GENERAL RULES

1. Every entry must be entered in the name of the GROWER.
2. Anyone trying to deceive the Fair with regard to being the grower of their entries shall forfeit all claims as an exhibitor.
3. Each exhibitor will receive **one gate pass** regardless of the number of items entered, with the exception of Beer and Wine exhibitors. See pages 23 and 25.
4. Please remember these five important quality points before you bring in your fruit or vegetable exhibits:
 - a) FORM — should be typical for the variety.
 - b) SIZE — conformity, commercial, what is desired for best consumption.
 - c) COLOR — high, clear and intense.
 - d) UNIFORMITY — all specimens on display should be similar in size and color.
 - e) NO BLEMISHES — should be free from blemishes; insect, disease or mechanical damage.
5. Use same exhibitor number and entry form for all agriculture and horticulture exhibits.
6. Money will be paid only to first and second place winners, except for Junior Gardner, Bountiful Harvest Contest, Adult Division Scarecrow, and the Giant Pumpkin Competition. Third place will get a ribbon only.

DIVISION I FRUIT

No entry fee will be charged in this division

NOTE: ENTRY DAYS AND PLACE!

Entry times, except for the Junior Gardener Division and other special contests, are 10 am to 8 pm Tuesday, September 2, and from 8 am to 8 pm on Wednesday, September 3. Take your entries to the Agriculture Department on the west side of ShowPlex, next to Hobby Hall (#20D on Fair map, page 27)

Look on page 14 for the rules and class numbers for Organic Gardeners competition.

1. All exhibits will be donated to the Puyallup Food Bank. No items will be returned, except in the following categories: Largest Pumpkin, class 2608, Super Pumpkin or Squash classes 2605 and 2606, Scarecrows classes 6010, 3100, 3102 and 3104, and Honey Division classes.
2. Only 1st, 2nd and 3rd (blue, red and white) place winners will be displayed. All non-placing entries may not be displayed.
3. No article will be allowed to compete for more than one premium. This means if you have a collection of fruit, you must have duplicates to compete in other classes.
4. Cash prizes will be paid in listed classes only. **Ribbons will no longer be mailed. You may pick up your ribbons in the Ag Department office after Friday, September 5 through Sunday, September 21.** Checks will be mailed around October 15.
5. No berries are allowed.
6. In selecting fruit for exhibit, select uniform size, color and shape, and freedom from blemishes. **DEFECTIVE FRUIT WILL NOT BE RECEIVED.**
7. New and old variety classes are only for varieties not listed. If an item is placed in these classes, and there is a class listed for it, the entry will be disqualified.
8. In an effort to make sure only the best quality fruits are displayed, you must have them checked at a check-in table where a staff member will ensure that no obviously damaged or blemished fruits are entered.

9. Our Ag-Hort staff will help you prepare your entry, should you need any assistance.
10. Exhibitors entering fruit classes, "Open for New Varieties," must have some proof that the entry is a new variety.
11. Any entry that has lost its exhibit value due to decomposition or drying may be discarded at the discretion of the Ag-Hort staff.
12. 1/2-tray equals an area approximately 10"x12", and will be provided by the Fair.
13. A plate equals 6" in diameter and will be provided by the Fair.
14. A Grand Champion Rosette will be awarded to the exhibitor who receives the most first place awards. The following point system will be used. Class 1100 will receive 3 points for first place; those receiving first place rosettes will receive 2 points for each one; those receiving first place flat ribbons will receive 1 point for each one.

FRUIT JUDGING RULES

FORM — the form should be typical of the variety for the locality where grown.

SIZE — the fruit should be of commercial size and conform to sizes given in connection with varieties listed.

COLOR — the fruit should have very high, clear, intense colors characteristic of the variety.

UNIFORMITY — all specimens should be uniform in color, size, form and maturity.

FREEDOM FROM ALL BLEMISHES — specimens for exhibit must be free from blemishes, including insect, disease and mechanical damage.

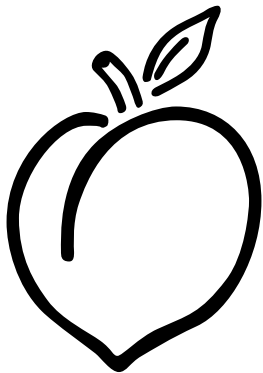

Look on page 14 for the rules and class numbers for Organic Gardeners competition.

1. All exhibits will be donated to the Puyallup Food Bank. No items will be returned except in the following categories: Largest Pumpkin, class 2608, Super Pumpkin or Squash classes 2605 and 2606, Scarecrows classes 6010, 3100, 3102 and 3104, and Honey Division classes.
2. Money will be paid only to first and second place winners, except for Junior Gardner and Super Pumpkin Competition. Third place will get a ribbon only.
3. Only 1st, 2nd and 3rd (blue, red and white) place winners will be displayed. All non-placing entries may not be displayed.
4. All classes to remain on display for the duration of the Fair may be picked up between 8 am and 11 am on Monday, Sept. 22 in the Agriculture Department.
5. No article will be allowed to compete for more than one premium. This means if you have a collection of vegetables, you must have duplicates to compete in other classes.
6. Cash prizes will be paid in listed classes only. **Ribbons will no longer be mailed. You may pick up your ribbons in the Ag Department office after Friday, September 5 through Sunday, September 21.** Checks will be mailed around October 15.
7. New and old variety classes are only for varieties not listed. If an item is placed in these classes, and there is a class listed for it, the entry will be disqualified.
8. All vegetables should be true to type and variety, medium in size, uniform and of good quality. Defective vegetables will not be received.
9. In an effort to make sure only the best quality vegetables are displayed, there is a slight

change in the entry procedure. When you bring your items to be entered, you must first have them checked at a check-in table where a staff member will ensure that no damaged or blemished vegetables are entered.

10. Our Ag-Hort staff can help you prepare your entry, should you need any assistance.
11. All root crops shall be washed and trimmed, leaving a 2" top. Cabbage shall be trimmed.
12. A pumpkin must have a hard, five-(5) sided stem to be entered in the largest pumpkin class, 2608. A squash must have a soft, round stem to be entered in the largest squash class 2720.
13. Exhibitors entering vegetable classes "Open for new varieties" must have some proof that the entry is a new variety.
14. Any entry that has lost its exhibit value due to decomposition or drying may be discarded at the discretion of the Ag-Hort staff.
15. 1/2-tray equals an area approximately 10"x12", and will be provided by the Fair.

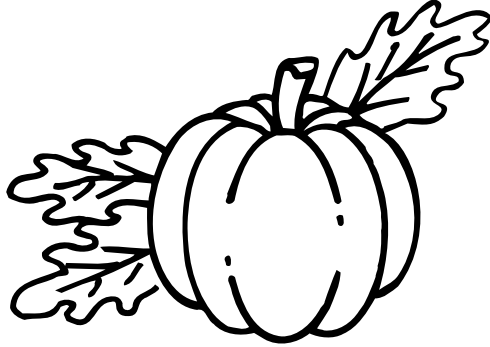

This is a consumer education event, as well as a competitive market display and advertising opportunity for the region's non-traditional, and often small scale producers. Each producer must create their own market design.

1. The Puyallup Fair will supply a flat surface display (table top) with a 3½" border lip that measures 48" x 48". You may request an illustration of the display area by e-mailing gordenekuan@hotmail.com.
2. Set up is Saturday, September 13, from 6 am to 9 am. Judging will take place after 10 am.
3. All vegetables and fruits displayed must be grown by the entrant. No flowers, canned goods, purchased or artificial produce shall be used. Only edible fruits and vegetables and embellishments may be displayed.
4. Judging will be based on the following criteria: abundance, quality of produce (free of blemishes from insect, disease or mechanical damage), use of space, variety of produce, use of color, overall consumer appeal, artistic arrangement, and presentation of signage, brochure and business card (farm logo or signage, not to exceed 9" x 11").
5. Signage must include a short description of cultural practices, i.e. the certification or statement of practices that defines the "organic" or "sustainable production" attributes of your farm.

1. All exhibits will be donated to the Puyallup food bank. No items will be returned except in the following categories: Largest Squash and Largest Pumpkin, classes 3002 and 3005, Super Pumpkin class 2606, Scarecrows classes 3100, 3102 and 3104, and Honey Division classes.
2. Any entry that has lost its exhibit value due to decomposition or drying may be discarded at the discretion of the Superintendent.
3. No article will be allowed to compete for more than one premium. This means if you have a collection of vegetables, you must have duplicates to compete in other classes.
4. Cash prizes will be paid in listed classes only. **Ribbons will no longer be mailed. You may pick up your ribbons in the Ag Department office after Friday, September 5 through Sunday, September 21.** Checks will be mailed around October 15.
5. Exhibits entered in fruit and vegetable classes should be true to type and variety, medium in size, uniform and of good quality.
6. In an effort to make sure only the best quality fruits and vegetables are displayed, there will be a slight change in the entry procedure. When you bring your items to be entered you must first have them checked at a check-in table where

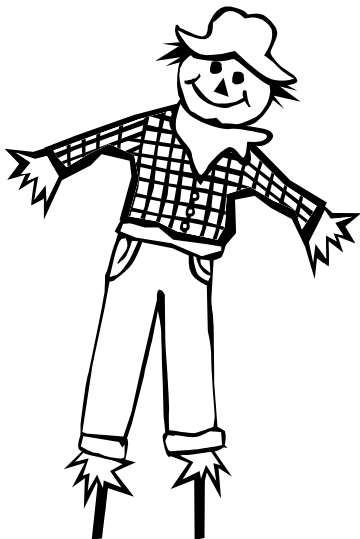

- All winning honey will remain on display in the Pierce County Beekeepers Association booth for the duration of the Fair.
- First, second and third place ribbons will be awarded for each class. All classes are to be judged as Open or Novice category. All entrants must register as either Open or Novice. The Novice category may be entered only by individuals who have never won an award in any class. Open and Novice category entries in each class will be judged separately. A JUDGES' BEST OF SHOW AWARD SHALL BE PRESENTED TO THE OPEN AND NOVICE ENTRY WHICH BEST REPRESENTS THE APICULTURE INDUSTRY.

- Cash prizes will be paid in listed classes only. **Ribbons will no longer be mailed. You may pick up your ribbons in the Ag Department office after Friday, September 5 through Sunday, September 21.** Checks will be mailed around October 15.

ENTRY INFORMATION

1. FEES – An entry fee of \$3.00 will be charged for each entry. (Two bottles of wine are required for each entry.) Entries will be accepted on a first come, first served basis until a maximum of 500 entries is reached. Each exhibitor will receive two gate passes at time of entry.
2. ENTRY DAY – Entry is limited to **ONE DAY ONLY – SATURDAY, AUGUST 16**. The entry time is no earlier than 10 am, or later than 4 pm. **Wine entries will be received inside the grounds; enter through the Red Gate area on 9th Ave. SW.** Entrants must not be or have ever been affiliated with a commercial winery. Entrants must meet all Washington state and Federal laws defining amateur winemaking status. (Examples: wine is for personal use only; per household production limit of 200 gallons per calendar year.) Entries will be judged on August 24, 2008.
3. SPECIFIC GRAVITY – Persons entering their wines are responsible for determining the specific gravity and for entering them in the correct class. The Puget Sound Amateur Wine and Beer Making Club will provide assistance with the measurements of specific gravity, if needed, at the time of entry. Specific gravity must be included on the entry form and on the wine information labels. Wines entered in the wrong class will not be judged.
4. ENTRY DISPOSITION – All bottles and contents will become the property of the Puget Sound Amateur Wine and Beer Making Club.

BOTTLE REQUIREMENTS

5. BOTTLES AND CLOSURES – All entries must be in standard cylindrical wine bottles, fitted with a suitable closure (no bottle caps). Wine must be in standard 750 ml bottles. Cordials/Liqueurs must be in standard 375 ml bottles. Sparkling wine corks must be wired on or capped.

6. CLEANLINESS – All bottles must appear sterile and be totally free of any commercial label, or they will not be accepted for entry.
7. QUANTITY – For each wine entered, two bottles are required: one for judging and a second for display.
8. LABELS – Informational: Each bottle of wine entered must have a **white label containing the wine information, including the entrant's name, the kind of wine** (the particular ingredient, not the wine's "name"), and **its specific gravity**. If the wine is a blend, all ingredients must be listed in order of their percentage.

Decorative: For display purposes, your personal decorative label may also be affixed to one or both bottles. This label should contain your name and may include any wording you wish, including the wine's name (i.e., "Fred's Red").

9. ACCURACY – If any bottle is discovered to contain anything other than the wine specified on its label, the entry will be disqualified.

JUDGING

10. METHOD – Each wine entry will be judged on its own merits, by more than one judge.
11. CRITERIA – Wines will be judged on their clarity and color, aroma and bouquet, body, flavor, balance and finish.
12. CATEGORIES – Wines are grouped as follows: Fruit/Berry, Country, Grape-Non-Varietal, Grape-Varietal, Dessert/After-Dinner, Sparkling, and Cordial/Liqueur. Additional classes may be created, or classes consolidated, based on the entry of sufficient numbers of particular wine varieties or styles.

AWARDS

13. AWARDS – First and second place winners will receive a rosette and a cash premium. Third place will receive a rosette only. In the event of a tie, ribbons or rosettes and cash premiums will be awarded to all place winners. Scores will determine "Best in Category" (contenders must be 1st place winners). The winners of each category will receive a "Best in Category" large rosette. Exhibitors who tie in "Best of Category" will each receive a rosette. Judges will determine the "Best of Show" from among the "Best in Category" winners. Best in Show

8. Each beer entry will be judged on its own merits by more than one judge. Judging points will be based on Bouquet, Aroma, Appearance, Flavor, Body, Drinkability and Overall Impression. Judges will determine the Best in Show from among the 1st Place winners.
9. Only winning beers will be on display for the run of the Puyallup Fair (September 5 - 21) in the Puget Sound Amateur Wine & Beer Makers booth in the Agriculture Department, located

in the west side of Americraft ShowPlex, next to Hobby Hall (#20D on Fair map, page 27).

10. First and second place winners will receive a rosette and a cash premium. Third place winners will receive a rosette. Best in Show winner will receive an extra large, fancy rosette. Only one “Best of Show” will be awarded. Rosettes and ribbons will no longer be mailed. They will be presented at the Awards Ceremony on Friday, October 3. Those not presented at the ceremony will be made available for pick up in the Entry Office at the Fair on weekdays between 8 am and 4:30 pm. Call Pat at (253) 841-5017 to make arrangements to pick them up. Premiums will be mailed in October.

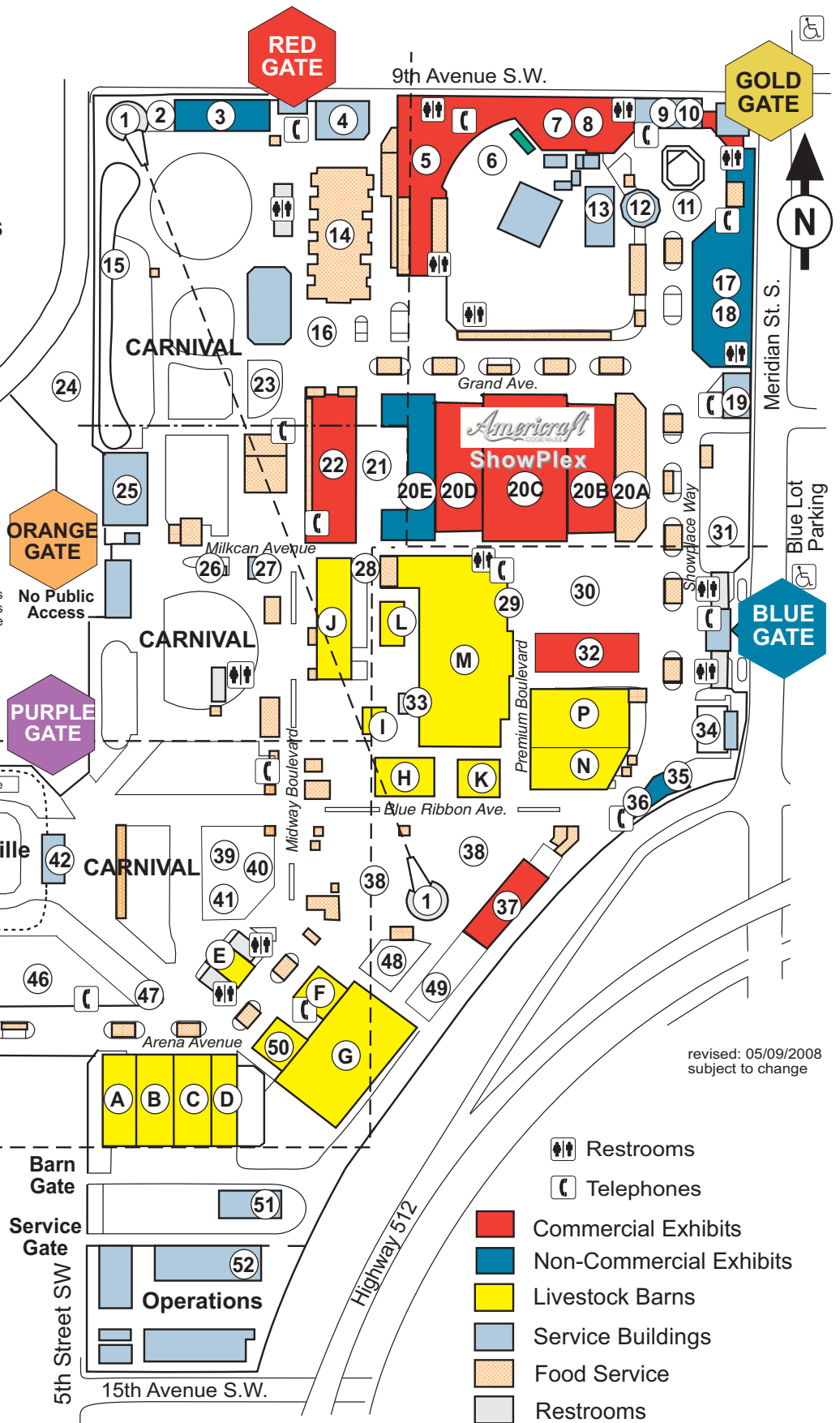
