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DEPARTMENTAL EXHIBITORS RULES AND REGULATIONS

The general supervision of the entire Puyallup Fair and Spring Fair in Puyallup, including all exhibits, entertainment and concessions, has been vested by the Western Washington Fair Association board of directors in the Chief Executive Officer of the Association.

1. The Association will have officers on the grounds and will use every reasonable precaution in its power for the preservation and protection of persons, articles on exhibition, entries, livestock and property, but will not be responsible for loss or damage by theft, fire or otherwise.

TRADEMARKS AND COPYRIGHTS

2. Certain words, slogans and graphic symbols have been established to represent the Puyallup Fair and the Spring Fair in Puyallup, and are the exclusive property of the Western Washington Fair Association. "The Spring Fair in Puyallup" and "The Puyallup Fair" are trade names registered with Washington's Secretary of State. Artwork, slogans, music and other communications created to promote or represent the Association or its annual fairs are likewise protected by law. This includes the phrase "Do the Puyallup" and the music and lyrics of the song, "Do the Puyallup," the wordmark combining "THE SPRING FAIR IN PUYALLUP" and "THE PUYALLUP FAIR" and other temporary slogans such as "It's Spring, Baby!", "Epic Fun" or "I Love This Fair."

The valuable trade names and protected slogans and symbols may not be used without the express written consent of the Fair. In general, permission is granted under license, i.e., for consideration, or by permission under special circumstances. Submit requests to the marketing manager, along with complete information on frequency and distribution, including examples or written description of the proposed use.

WHEN ADDRESSING CORRESPONDENCE TO THE FAIR, PLEASE NOTE DEPARTMENT TO WHICH IT BELONGS ON THE FACE OF THE ENVELOPE.

3. Exhibitors should check each department for specific entry information. Read the special rules and other information printed in connection with the classification and prize list in each department. Note the time set for the closing of entries.
4. Every animal or article must be entered in the name of the owner, maker or grower.

ANYONE TRYING TO DECEIVE THE COMMITTEE WITH REGARD TO OWNERSHIP OF EXHIBIT, OR WHO SHALL PURCHASE OR BORROW THEM AND EXHIBIT THEM AS OF HIS OR HER OWN MANUFACTURE OR PRODUCTION, SHALL FORFEIT ALL CLAIMS AS AN EXHIBITOR.
5. No "FOR SALE" cards will be allowed on exhibits, in the buildings, or on the grounds.
6. Fair management reserves the right to cancel any class without prior notice for reasons deemed advisable by Fair legal counsel and/or Fair veterinarian.

ARRIVAL TIME OF EXHIBITS

7. The Puyallup Fair will be open for the receiving of articles according to the specified rules governing individual departments.
8. EXHIBITS MUST BE IN PLACE AT 8:00 A.M. THE FIRST DAY OF THE FAIR UNLESS OTHERWISE NOTED. CHECK EACH DEPARTMENT'S ENTRY INFORMATION FOR POSSIBLE EXCEPTIONS.

PREMIUMS AND AWARDS

9. First premiums shall be designated by blue ribbons, second premiums by red ribbons, third premiums by white ribbons, fourth premiums by pink ribbons, and fifth premiums by yellow ribbons.

10. No animal or article shall be allowed to compete for more than one open class premium, nor shall it be entered in more than one class, except as one of a herd, pair or pen, fur or wool, get of sire or dam, or in sweepstakes or championship classes. However, 4-H and FFA exhibitors may also show their registered livestock in open classes, provided their entries are received by the closing date for entries in the open class, and providing there is no conflict in judging schedule with the junior show.
11. No animal or article shall be removed from the Fair before the close of the Fair or show, except by special permission from the superintendent. Any animal or article taken away before the close of the Fair or show without the permission of the superintendent shall forfeit all premiums. LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS: SEE RULES IN REGARD TO SPLIT SHOWS UNDER SPECIFIC DEPARTMENTS.
12. Unless otherwise stated by a specific department, in cases where exhibits are tied for prizes, awards shall be determined as follows:
 - A. If the premium is a trophy, medal or any other award except a cash prize, the exhibitors entering these exhibits shall draw lots, the winner being awarded the premium.
 - B. If the premium is a cash prize, the money shall be divided equally among the exhibitors concerned. The next lower cash premium, if any, offered in the class shall be added to the premium for which the entries are tied, and then the division shall be made equally.
13. Cash prizes shall be paid to winners only in classes included in the judge's list.
14. The judges shall report only the animals or articles entitled to premiums in the judge's list, though they may commend others they deem worthy. The superintendent may deny entry to any animal or exhibit he deems unworthy of public display.
15. No animal or article deemed unworthy shall be awarded a premium. No premiums shall be withheld merely because there is no competition. Decision of the judge shall be final.
16. No person shall be allowed to see the judging books until after the awards have been made and entered.

PENALTIES AND PROTESTS

17. Fair management will appoint a superintendent and one or more judges for each division when deemed necessary. No person can act as a judge in any division or class in which there is any direct or indirect

interest in the result as owner or agent; and when awards have been made in violation of this rule Fair management reserves the right to appoint a new judge and to compel another examination.

18. Any person interfering with the judge during the adjudication of awards will forfeit the right of premiums. All officers or judges are required, and exhibitors are requested, to report any violation of this rule to the department superintendent.
19. All protests must be made in writing, and must be accompanied by a deposit of \$25.00, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal, and must be filed with the Puyallup Fair Entry Office within 24 hours after the cause of protest.
20. NO PERSON SHALL BE ALLOWED TO SELL OR GIVE AWAY ARTICLES ON THE GROUNDS, EITHER DURING THE FAIR OR AT ANY TIME BEFORE THE COMMENCEMENT OF THE SAME, UNTIL THE LICENSE FOR THE PRIVILEGE SHALL HAVE BEEN PAID AND RECEIPT THEREFORE ISSUED. THIS INCLUDES BALLOONS OR OTHER NOVELTIES FOR WHICH THE FAIR CONTRACTS THE SALE PRIVILEGE.

PERSONALITY RIGHTS

Exhibitor hereby grants to Western Washington Fair Association ("WWFA") the irrevocable, assignable, worldwide right and license to use, alter and publish his/her image, alone or together with other images and text, for WWFA publications and for all other purposes reasonably related to promotion of WWFA, the Spring Fair in Puyallup and Puyallup Fair, in any manner and in any medium now known or later developed, without the need for exhibitor's prior approval. This right and license will govern all images of exhibitor, whether created before or after the date of these Rules and Regulations, unless exhibitor notifies WWFA in writing that of a desire to exclude specific images from this right and license. Exhibitor hereby releases the photographer and/or videographer and WWFA, its agents and assigns, from all claims and liability relating to the licenses that exhibitor has granted in this license and release. This license and release will not obligate WWFA to use or publish exhibitor's image or use the rights exhibitor has granted.

ELECTRICAL USAGE NOTICE

Electrical appliances which draw more than 200 watts and which are used for the personal convenience of exhibitors (kettles, coffee pots, space heaters, air conditioners, hot plates, etc.) are not allowed without permission. A costly power failure can result from overloading circuits.

NO COOKING OR EATING IS ALLOWED IN THE BARN.

VEHICLE UNLOADING PROCEDURES

The Puyallup Fair is continually striving to make setup of merchandise and animal exhibits safer and more efficient. We are asking for your full cooperation in this safety program. **If you do not need to drive onto the grounds, please park in a Fair parking lot and hand truck or walk in.** When you have to drive in and unload, do so as quickly as possible and exit.

Security Check

Each vehicle entering the grounds will be subject to search prior to entering the grounds. Please enter designated Security Checkpoint Staging Area located at the Service Gate area. Expect delays.

Service Gate

Enter to receive vehicle permit to unload on grounds. You will be allowed one hour to unload and exit the grounds. Your pass will be date/time stamped. If you absolutely cannot complete your unloading in one hour, you must get the pass validated by a department superintendent or an administrative person.

Traffic Pattern

Follow the traffic patterns as established. Surrender the vehicle permit at the time you exit the grounds.

Fine

If you take longer than one hour and do not have validation for an extension, there is a parking fine of \$10.00 per hour.

During Fair Time

Concessionaires and sponsors with vehicles will be allowed through the Service Gate between 6:00 am and 8:30 am with a Service Road Vehicle Permit. You will receive your gate permit from the attendant at the gate. **NO** vehicles are allowed through the gate after 8:30 am. All vehicles must be removed from the grounds by 9:00 am. Vehicles left unattended and without a permit for parking past the allotted time will either receive a warning and be asked to remove the vehicle from the grounds or be towed away at the owner's expense. Do not park in front of doorways or in vehicle traffic lanes. Your vehicle may be towed away. **HANG VEHICLE PERMIT ON THE REAR VIEW MIRROR SO YOU CAN BE FOUND IN AN EMERGENCY. Include the building where you can be located and your cell phone number.** Please unload quickly and remove your vehicle from the grounds. **NO KEYS ARE TO BE LEFT IN MOTORIZED VEHICLES ON DISPLAY.**

VETERINARIAN RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

TOP FIVE DISEASE PREVENTION RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Segregation – Prevent contact of your livestock with other animals.
2. Restrict use of feed, equipment, and trailers to your animals.
3. Do not remove feed/bedding from the Fair. Equipment used at the Fair should be cleaned and disinfected.
4. Notify a veterinarian immediately if an animal becomes sick.
5. Isolate animals returning home for 30 days.

BIOSECURITY CHECKLIST FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

Before and During the Fair

- Monitor visitors to your animals and farm, especially if they have traveled outside the country.
- Make sure all veterinary health inspections and certificates of veterinary inspection are current for all animals you will take to the Fair.
- Follow the Fair vaccination guidelines and give recommended vaccination at least 10 days before the event.
- Disinfect all equipment, such as buckets, shovels, wheelbarrows, manure baskets, lead ropes, blankets snares, clippers, scissors, brushes, showbox and so forth before entering the fairgrounds.
- Don't share equipment with other exhibitors unless it has been cleaned and disinfected before and after use.
- Eliminate traffic between exhibitors of different species (especially sheep and cattle). If it is not possible to eliminate this traffic, change clothing and disinfect hands before handling a different species.
- As much as possible, minimize feed and water changes from home to Fair.

- Keep unused equipment and feed bagged or covered to reduce the risk of contamination.
- Vehicles and trailers used to transport animals to and from the Fair should be well cleaned and disinfected, inside and out, between uses.
- Do not mix species in the same trailer. Avoid commercial haulers with multiple animals from multiple farms.
- Clean and disinfect all items at the end of the Fair before taking them home.
- Properly dispose of unused bedding, hay and feed after the Fair. Do not bring it home.
- Minimize stress by keeping animals cool, well bedded and comfortable.

After the Fair

- Keep Fair animals isolated from other animals and pets for at least 30 days.
- Check these isolated animals every day for any signs of illness. Contact a vet if you see any unusual symptoms.
- Care for isolated animals separately, then shower, change your clothes and clean and disinfect your boots before going to other areas of the farm.
- The person caring for animals at the Fair should not perform animal-related chores at home. If the same person must do both, chores at home should be done first. Garments should be cleaned and disinfected between each trip to the Fair and barn/pasture.

OPEN CLASS VETERINARIAN INFORMATION: Livestock from WITHIN Washington State

The 2009 Exhibition Livestock Health requirements include many changes. Please read carefully.

The following are the minimum animal health requirements for the Puyallup Fair, including cattle, goats, sheep, llamas, horses, swine, pigeons, poultry, rabbits and cavies originating within the state of Washington. The Fair will have official veterinarians available for animal health care.

1. Individual Certificate of Veterinary Inspections on Washington animals is not required for entry into the Fair.
2. No animal from a quarantined area or premise may be permitted to enter the Fair or show.
3. OUT-OF-STATE ANIMAL ENTRIES MUST COMPLY WITH STATE OF WASHINGTON IMPORT REGULATIONS. NO EXEMPTIONS UNLESS EXEMPTED BY RULE.
4. Fair veterinarians will inspect all classes of livestock and poultry (including, but not limited to cattle, swine, horses, pet animals, rabbits, fur-bearing animals, pigeons, ducks, geese, turkeys, etc.) before they are permitted access into the barns to determine that the livestock and poultry show no clinical indications of contagious, infectious diseases and ectoparasites.
5. Fair veterinarians will reject any animal with infectious or contagious diseases or ectoparasites. Exhibitors should be made aware that ringworm, warts, pinkeye, strangles, contagious ecthyma, scabies, lice, mites, ticks and fleas fall into these categories.
6. Animals exhibiting disease symptoms during the course of the Fair will be removed from the exhibit areas, and either be sent home or kept in a quarantined area.
7. It is strongly recommended, but not required, that cattle be vaccinated in the current show year against respiratory diseases. Any cattle going to the Fair should have adequate protection against IBR, BVD, PI3, and BRSV.
8. Killed products need appropriate booster to have maximum benefit depending on what vaccines have been given in the past. In addition, they should have five-way lepto and eight-way clostridial protection. It also doesn't pay to buy the cheapest product available. There is a difference in vaccines. The intranasal product is suggested, whether or not it will protect for MCF, it will give IBR protection.
9. The Fair veterinarian's professional decision as to the health status of an animal will be final and will be upheld by the Fair board.
10. Animals and birds not intended for exhibition will be denied entry to the grounds. Please leave your pet at home for its own protection, with the exception of guide/service animals. They should be properly protected against infectious and communicable diseases as indicated for exhibit animals.
11. The Puyallup Fair requires all goats and sheep to be tagged or tattooed with Scrapie Identification.
12. All sheep will be inspected with blankets removed before allowed entrance to the barns.

Please remember that E.coli 0157:H7 infection can be transmitted by contact with animals. Youngsters, seniors and immune impaired persons are particularly susceptible. Hand washing facilities are available and should be used wherever human-animal or animal waste contact is possible, and signage directing the public to those facilities is visible throughout the barns.

OPEN CLASS VETERINARIAN INFORMATION: Livestock from OUTSIDE Washington State

Exhibitors of animals and birds originating outside of Washington must comply with state rules and regulations in addition to the requirements of the Puyallup Fair.

Entry permits are required for all out-of-state cattle. A blanket permit to each Fair will be issued upon request by calling (360) 902-1878. The blanket permit number for the 2009 Puyallup Fair is 91-C1432 for out-of-state exhibitors. Their veterinarians need not call if they use this permit number on health certificates for this Fair only.

Permits for special livestock sales may be obtained by calling the Livestock Identification Program at (360) 725-5505.

All out-of-state animals going to Fairs must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection except for Idaho and Oregon dogs, horses, sheep, goats, alpacas and llamas traveling to Washington with their owners in personal vehicles for roundtrip visits of not more than 96 hours. It requires that the Fair management provides veterinary inspection on arrival, and rejects any unhealthy animal. This exemption does not apply during emergency disease conditions declared by the State Veterinarian, or extend to any required testing.

OUT-OF-STATE CATTLE

All cattle are required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (health certificate) listing official individual identification and an import permit, which may be the blanket permit for the Fair, 91-C1432.

All dairy bulls over six months of age and any dairy females over 20 months require a negative Brucellosis test within 30 days of shipment if being sold. No test is required if for show only.

All dairy bulls and heifers over six months of age require a negative Tuberculosis test within 60 days of shipment.

Any breed cattle over six months of age from the states of California, Michigan, Minnesota and New Mexico and the countries of Canada and Mexico require a negative Tuberculosis test within 60 days of shipment.

All cattle are required to have an ownership inspection (brand) from the state of origin prior to entering the Fair.

Canadian Cattle: These cattle must comply with Washington state import requirements. Non-vaccinated Canadian cattle will be allowed entry into the Fair and return to Canada. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, an entry permit number (blanket permit for the 2009 Fair is 91-C1432), a negative Tuberculosis test within 60 days of shipment and a negative Brucellosis test within 30 days are required. If the cattle remain in the state, they must meet Washington Brucellosis requirements.

OUT-OF-STATE SHEEP AND GOATS

All sheep and goats are required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and all rams require an entry permit number. All sheep and goats must have official scrapie identification. Sheep and goats from Oregon and Idaho on a round trip of 96 hours or less are exempt from the requirement of a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, provided the Fair management furnishes veterinary inspection on arrival and rejects any unhealthy animals. For stays longer than 96 hours, they must meet the Washington state import requirements.

If lactating goats are entering, their milk must be discarded during any stay in Washington, unless they have been tested for Brucellosis and Tuberculosis.

OUT-OF-STATE ALPACAS LLAMAS

Llamas and alpacas are required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. The exception includes those from Idaho and Oregon on a round trip of not more than 96 hours, provided the Fair management furnishes veterinary inspection on arrival and rejects any unhealthy animals.

OUT-OF-STATE POULTRY AND PIGEONS

All poultry entering Washington state for exhibition purposes must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (health certificate) within 30 days of shipment.

All poultry entering Washington state for exhibition purposes must originate from a NPIP participant flock or be tested negative for pullorum-thyphoid, Salmonella enteritidis and avian influenza within 30 days of shipment.

OUT-OF-STATE HORSES

All horses are required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, and horses over six months of age are required to have evidence of a negative test for (EIA) equine infectious anemia within six (6) months of entry.

Horses from Oregon and Idaho on a round trip of 96 hours or less are exempt from the requirement of a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and EIA testing, provided the Fair management furnishes veterinary inspection on arrival and rejects any unhealthy animals

All horses are required to have an ownership inspection (brand) prior to leaving the state of origin.

OUT-OF-STATE SWINE

All swine are required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and an import permit number, which may be the blanket permit number issued to that Fair.

All swine six months and over coming from the state of Texas must be negative to a Brucellosis test within 30 days prior to entry into Washington, except swine originating from a validated Brucellosis-free herd.

Dairy Cattle entry forms due Monday, August 17, 2009. Any entries postmarked after August 17 may be assessed an additional \$10.00 per head late fee. The entry fees must accompany entry or they will be returned. The superintendent has the sole discretion to limit entries to capacity of barn.

There is no entry fee for group classes.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

All dairy cattle, including animals in the Junior Show, must be entered in and pay entry fee for the Open Show. Junior exhibitors need not **show** in the Open Show. Junior Show animals must **also** enter Junior Show classes, **but need not pay additional entry fees**.

If you are sending money for trailer hook-up with your entry fee, please make **two separate checks** - one for entry fee and one for hook-up.

Entry fees will not be refunded unless cancellation is received by August 31, 2009, or if the superintendent is presented with a veterinary certificate stating health reason for cancellation.

JUNIOR DAIRY EXHIBITOR SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES

The Puyallup Fair will sponsor showmanship classes for junior exhibitors involved in the Open Dairy Show. The contest, which will include junior exhibitors from all the breeds in that section, will take place once during each section of the Open Dairy Show (see schedule). Classes will be divided in the four following age groups:

- Beginning Showmanship: Under nine years of age before January 1, 2009
- Junior Showmanship: Between nine and 12 years of age
- Intermediate Showmanship: Between 13 and 15 years of age
- Senior Showmanship: No younger than 16, and no older than 20 years of age prior to January 1, 2009

Sign-up for the showmanship classes will take place in the Dairy Office at check-in time. Juniors participating must provide: full name, age, address

Juniors do not need to be the registered owner of the animals used in the showmanship classes. All animals must be entered in the Open Dairy Show.

Premium Schedule #10 will be used for the showmanship classes.

ARRIVAL AND DEPARTURE

First section cattle will not be permitted to enter the facilities before Tuesday, September 8, 2009 at 8 am. If it is necessary for you to arrive at a time other than between 8 am and 10 pm on Tuesday, September 8, you must call Andrea at (253) 841-5074 by September 4 before 4:30 pm with your arrival time so a veterinarian is available to check your animals into the barn. You will be charged a minimum of \$100. **NO** animals will be allowed in the barn unless vet checked.

All dairy cattle in Section I must be in place no later than 10 pm Tuesday, September 8, 2009. All dairy cattle in Section I will be released at 6 pm on Saturday, September 12, 2009, with those traveling the greatest distance released first.

All dairy cattle in Section II should be in place Sunday, September 13, 2009 between 6 am and 10 am. All dairy cattle in Section II will be released at 6 pm on Thursday, September 17, 2009, with those traveling the greatest distance released first.

All exhibitors should make every effort to vacate their stalls as soon as possible after being released to facilitate barn cleaning prior to the arrival of other animals.

DAIRY CATTLE RULES

- **Alcoholic beverages are not permitted at the Puyallup Fair & Events Center, except in designated areas.**
- Smoking is not allowed in the barns.
- No nurse cows will be permitted at the Puyallup Fair.
- No dogs will be allowed in the dairy barns.
- All cattle entered for competition must be made available for special judging contests, if requested by the management. The management will make every effort to insure that animals used in such contests will be properly handled. Class selections for contests will be made by the personnel in charge of those contests.
- For the safety of our exhibitors, it is highly recommended that gas powered washers be used at the Fair instead of washers using electricity.
- Animals may not be walked on or off the facilities because of serious environmental concerns directly related to animals waste. Any animal (except horses) that cannot be

transported in a solid bottom carrier must be removed in a truck, trailer or similar conveyance.

- No cooking is allowed in the barns.

Eating in the Barns vs. E.coli O157:H7 – Exhibitor cooperation needed.

Again this year our barns will not only have signage reminding Fair guests to “Wash your hands upon leaving any livestock area” but also “Please refrain from eating in livestock areas”.

The State Health Department has asked the Fair to request that our livestock exhibitors set an example for Fair guests and refrain from eating in most areas of the barns. In order to accommodate the Health Department’s request as well as address our exhibitors’ needs, we have set aside a good-sized area, screened from public view, in the south end of the dairy barn for exhibitors to eat.

All animals entering the judging ring must have their entry numbers prominently displayed on the person showing the animal.

REGISTRATION

All animals entered for exhibition shall be registered in a recognized breed association, and the exhibitor shall present registration certificates to the Dairy Superintendent at the time the cattle are admitted. All entries must be registered with the association of the breed in which they are to show.

OWNERSHIP

The Fair official shall check all certificates for ownership, age, entry into correct class, and to identify the animal. Ownership shall be determined by the name that appears on the certificate of registration. All entries must be exhibited under ownership of the person, partnership or company whose name appears on the registration papers or by their designated exhibitor. Signed transfer applications will not be accepted as evidence of ownership.

EXHIBITOR/BREEDER

An exhibitor and/or breeder is defined as follows: “Where a herd is registered in the names of different members of a family residing on one farm and where the herd is one unit, all entries may be considered as a single exhibitor for Premier Exhibitor, Premier Breeder, Dairy Herd, Junior Best Three Females, Get of Sire, State Herd and Best Three Females Classes.”

Animals owned in partnership or by a syndicate may be shown in the name of the partnership or

syndicate only; except that at time of entry a determination shall be made that such animals will be shown in the name of one partner or syndicate member, and the animals must be shown the same way in the group classes, including State Herd, as they are in the open individual classes.

GROUP CLASSES

In the group classes an exhibitor is defined as: All members of a family or partnership where the cattle are housed on the same farm.

Any animal to be shown in any of the group classes must first be shown in its proper individual class.

Registration papers will be required at ringside for group classes.

TAMPERING

Tampering and Misrepresentation - Any artificial means of removing or remedying the physical defects of conformation in the exhibition of cattle, such as cutting ties or lifting and filling under the skin will be considered as fraud and deception. All animals showing evidence of such treatment will be barred from competition at the Puyallup Fair. Misrepresentation of the age of an animal will be considered in the same light. See Show Ring Code Of Ethics.

PASSES

Each exhibitor will be sent two one-day gate admission passes with their entry confirmation papers. In addition, one pass per day per each five head entered can be picked up from the superintendent after arrival at the Fair, specifically for use by the exhibitor and/or their herdsman.

BASE DATES

Base dates for all individual classes shall be March 1 and September 1. Members of groups or herds shall meet the same requirements as for individual classes.

CHAMPIONSHIPS

The competition for Reserve Championship in both sexes shall include the animal winning second place in the individual class which furnishes the Grand Champion, in addition to first prize winners in all other classes.

PREMIER AWARDS

In computing the award for Premier Breeder, credit will be given in all regular single classes. This award will be made to the breeder winning the most points on his/her best six head, including animals bred by him/her and exhibited by others. The award

for Premier Exhibitor will be computed in the same manner as Premier Breeder on the top six animals owned by exhibitor. In both cases no more than one of the six animals can be a bull. The calculations will be made on listed premiums and will not include added premiums for production record.

VETERINARY RULES

Please see General Veterinary Information and Cattle Health Requirements in front of this book or, if applicable, the Regulatory Information for Out-of-State Exhibitors.

DORMS

4-H dormitories at the Puyallup Fair will be available for use by 4-H State Fair/State FFA Exhibitors and chaperones, only while participating in the 4-H State Fair or the Washington State FFA Exhibition. Open class exhibitors should make arrangements for accommodations off the facility.

PRODUCTION RECORDS

Records used in figuring Production Bonus and Total Performance must be DHIA OR DHIR records. DHIA test capability is available at the Fair. **Production papers must be presented to the clerks when registration papers are checked to be considered for individual production awards within the individual cow classes.**

HAY, BEDDING, AND GRAIN

The hay and bedding storage shed will not be open to exhibitors. Hay and bedding orders, in writing, must be in your superintendent's hands before 6 pm to satisfy your requirements for the following day. Hay bales shall not be used for purposes other than feed. Bedding must not protrude any more than 12" past the aisle support post.

All hay and bedding for cattle exhibited in the Dairy Department will be furnished by the Puyallup Fair, free of charge. Grain and other supplies for non-milking animals may be purchased from local suppliers, and orders may need to be placed **a day in advance** of delivery.

CATTLE RELEASE

At posted times of release all livestock exhibits shall be removed to permit clean-out and disinfecting of barns. Early arrivals and holdovers may be accommodated by special arrangements, if conditions allow.

PREMIUMS

Each exhibitor is limited to two premiums per class, except where noted.

PLEASE NOTE: We will no longer require a social security number on your entry form. If it is likely that you will receive \$600 or more in premiums, you must fill out a W-9 form at the Dairy Office at check-in time. If a W-9 is not on file in the Entry Office for anyone winning \$600 or more, a W-9 form will be mailed to you and your premium check will be held until the completed form is returned. **Please make sure the name and social security number listed on the W-9 form is the same as the person receiving the premiums.**

Premium checks will be mailed around the middle of October, barring unforeseen circumstances.

SUGGESTIONS FOR DAIRY CATTLE EXHIBITORS

Every animal exhibited must constantly be kept in the best possible condition. Stalls must be kept clean. The Fair will completely clean out stall and barns between shows, but the exhibitors are responsible for manure pick-up during the time they are at the Fair.

Attractive and informative signs concerning ownership and breeding are encouraged. The superintendent should be consulted to determine the most desirable location for them. No FOR SALE signs or signs advertising any brand of feed or other commodity will be permitted in the cattle barns.

Every exhibitor should be interested in the Dairy Department being made and kept as attractive as possible. This cannot be done if each exhibitor undertakes to show his cattle in his own way and not in harmony with the entire exhibit.

An exhibitor is unfair to themselves, or the owner of the cattle they are exhibiting, if they do not present their animals in the best of condition at all times. This cannot be done if a barrel of water, a few bales of hay, and cast-off clothing and unattractive bedding are permitted to interfere with the general appearance of the exhibit.

If you are using grooming chutes, remember that alleyways must be kept clear for Fair visitors. Grooming chutes must be placed in line with the cattle. No special fee will be collected. However, the superintendent requests that, if an exhibitor is going to use a grooming chute, they indicate their intention at the time they send in their entry so space can be allowed for the chute. We cannot tolerate obstructed alleyways, and it should be the duty of every exhibitor to present their exhibit in the best manner possible. The mess that is evident with the use of grooming chutes must be kept to a minimum.

SHOW RING CODE OF ETHICS

The following Show Ring Code of Ethics, adopted by the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association for all Dairy Breeds will be in effect: (Adopted by PDCA on April 3, 2004)

PDCA endorses this Show Ring Code of Ethics for all dairy breed shows and pledges its full cooperative support for its enforcement to show management, show judges, and the national breed associations.

The application of this Code of Ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this Code of Ethics. Dairy cattle exhibitors shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship.

It is recognized that there are certain practices in the proper care and management of dairy cattle that are necessary in the course of moving dairy cattle to and between shows that are advisable to keep them in a sound, healthy state so they might be presented in the show ring in a natural, normal condition. At all times, exhibition livestock shall be treated in a humane manner and in accordance with dairy quality assurance practices so as to protect the health, safety and welfare of the livestock and the consuming public. No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he or she knows, or has reason to suspect, is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease, disease, or illegal or non-approved use of drugs, medication and/or prohibited substance, or residue.

The position of the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association is that all animals presented for exhibition shall be in their natural conformation and structure, free of any alteration or modification by injection or internal or external administration of any substance or by any involvement in unethical fitting.

Grooming and Preparation

Dairy cattle exhibitions are conducted under standards for evaluating conformation established by the PDCA Unified Score Card (1994), with specific breed characteristics taken into consideration by the show judge. In this connection, animals will be groomed and prepared for the judge's evaluation in order to display the animal's natural contour, conformation, performance and mobility. Specifically:

1. External applications of cosmetics that affect only appearance may be used, including by way of example hoof polishes and false switches.
2. The maximum allowable length of naturally growing hair anywhere on the top line is not to exceed 1". Exhibitors will be required to comply with this rule before the animal is allowed to enter the ring.
3. Addition of foreign objects, including but not limited to hair or hair substitutes, cloth or fiber, to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body is prohibited.
4. Externally sealing the teat end with a preparation that does not harm the animal's skin is permissible. Natural teat placement will be given preference over artificially positioned teats.

Violations:

False, Deceptive or Unacceptable Practices

These practices are violations of the Code of Ethics and will be reported to show management and may be reported to the respective national breed associations:

1. Misrepresenting the age and/or milking status of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
2. Treating the animal, particularly the udder, internally or externally:
 - a. with an irritant or counter-irritant;
 - b. using a device to artificially create or enhance the udder crease;
 - c. using other substances as detected by testing that causes changes in the udder to artificially improve the conformation;
 - d. plugging of teat canal with foreign substances.
3. Surgical or unethical insertion of any matter under the skin or into body cavities, performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body (e.g., administration of fluid via a stomach tube or other similar apparatus to fill the rumen), though not to preclude practices required or involved in normal management.
4. Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management or other exhibitors while in the show ring or other conduct detrimental to the breed or the show.
5. Challenging, threatening or interfering with an ethics committee appointed by show

management to monitor the animals on exhibit on the show grounds.

Exhibitor Responsibility

The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (hereinafter referred to as "Exhibitor") for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, milk, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Materials may also be collected by ultrasound and photographic methods, and by direct examination of animal.

The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (the "Exhibitor") to have disciplinary action for violation of this Show Ring Code of Ethics taken by show management, the state in which the show occurs, and/or the National Dairy Breed Association without recourse.

Show Ethics Committee

Each show should have an Ethics Committee. The make-up of this committee should include official breed representatives, representative(s) of show management (e.g., dairy cattle show superintendent, general manager), the official show veterinarian, and extension representative.

The Ethics Committee will be responsible for monitoring violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. The Ethics Committee will investigate the report of any violation and determine the accuracy of the allegation. The Ethics Committee will have the authority to inspect animals and related material to determine if violations have occurred.

Violations: Reporting and Investigation

Complaints of alleged violations can be reported to the breed superintendent, the show superintendent, show management, and/or the Ethics Committee.

Before An Animal is Shown

If the Ethics Committee suspects that a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics will occur if the animal is shown, and that violation is reasonably well established before the animal is shown, the Ethics Committee will submit a report to show management.

Show management will discuss the violation with the Exhibitor:

1. If, at the Exhibitor's discretion, the animal in question is not shown, no violation will have occurred.

2. If the Exhibitor wishes to challenge that a violation occurred, he/she/they will have opportunity to appeal to the Ethics Committee. If its decision is not changed, the Exhibitor will be denied opportunity to exhibit the animal in question.

During and After An Animal is Shown

All animals are subject to examination during judging. The judge and Ethics Committee are instructed to examine the top five (5) animals in each class closely for violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. When a violation may have occurred, a milk-out may be called for. This call may be by breed association rule, or by request of an authorized representative of the National Breed Association, the judge, the Ethics Committee, or show management.

If an animal is exhibited and a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics is subsequently suspected, investigated, and determined to have occurred, the violation will be reported to the Ethics Committee and show management for action. The Exhibitor will be notified of the violation and the supporting evidence, and invited to defend or explain the allegations.

Violations are subject to the disciplinary provisions of show management, the state in which the show occurs, and the National Dairy Breed Association. Sanctions may include any one, or a combination of the following:

- Forfeiture or return of awards, prizes, premiums or proceeds;
- Written letter of reprimand to the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (the "Exhibitor");
- Disqualification of the exhibition livestock from an exhibition;
- Disqualification of the exhibitor from the show;
- Publication of offense.

Disqualification may include any or all shows and classes, and may be for any number of years.

TRAVEL BONUS

To encourage exhibitors through the western United States and Canada to exhibit dairy cattle at the Fair, the Puyallup Fair will offer a travel bonus to any exhibitor or exhibitor unit that meets the following criteria:

1. The maximum number of head for which any exhibitor will be paid a travel bonus is ten (10) head per exhibitor. There will be no minimum number required.

2. Any exhibitor inside or outside of the state of Washington shall qualify for the travel bonus.
3. The exhibitor must apply for the travel bonus at the Dairy Cattle Office at check-in time. A form will be filled out which must include name of exhibitor, farm name, address, number of head (up to 10 only) and the entry numbers of the head you are claiming. If you have made arrangements with another exhibitor to haul his animals in exchange for his travel bonus, you must list his name and the entry numbers of his animals on the form along with your own (the total claimed may still only be 10 head).

Travel bonus payments will be allotted on the following scale:

IMPORTANT

If you wish to apply for the travel bonus, when you check in, request and complete a Travel Bonus Form, indicating the number of miles you traveled to the Fair (please be accurate), the number of your own head you are exhibiting and the entry numbers of your animals. It is your responsibility to make sure this information is accurate and submitted to the Dairy office.

BEST EXHIBIT

In lieu of a Herdsmanship Award, a "Best Exhibit" contest has been instituted. The Best Exhibit awards will be based on the following:

General appearance: Eye appeal, neatness, total picture presented, coordination of theme and showmanship.

Creativity: The use of color, material, ingenuity of presentation.

Educational: The display should tell a story about the exhibitor's breed of cattle, or the exhibitor's farm or breeding program, or a commodity (beef products or dairy products).

Herdsmanship: The upkeep of the display and cattle and cleanliness of total area and equipment.

Exhibitor: Cooperation with fellow exhibitors and Fair officials, and be willing to answer questions and meet the public.

Suggestions: Each display should include an attractive farm sign, animal identification and a small booth (optional). Equipment and tack boxes should be painted and in good repair. Pictures and posters can be used to tell the story the exhibitor wishes to convey.

MILKING PARLOR PROCEDURES

Milking facilities at the Fair are Grade A and state inspected. Milk will be checked for antibiotics. A violation of the P.M.O. (pasteurized milk ordinance) will result in forfeiture of all premiums. Any exhibitor causing such violation will be prohibited from future exhibition at the Fair.

The parlor is maintained during the Fair to provide a safe, convenient and orderly solution to the milking requirements, and to afford the visitor an opportunity to see how milk is produced. Every effort is being made to present the dairy industry at its best. In a variety of ways, we are telling the dairy story. Please assist us in this endeavor by your full cooperation with milking schedules, and by presenting your animals in such a manner as to produce the best possible public appearance.

Please note:

Because of the high costs for hauling, combined with the low price paid for the milk picked up at the Fair, you will not be compensated individually for your milk. Instead, what money is received for the milk will be divided between the three youth programs: 4-H, FFA and Junior Poultry.

The Fair will furnish dairy feed for use in the Milking Parlor. Please use it fairly without waste. It is your responsibility to sanitize your utensils before use. Facilities for this process are provided.

All milking cows receiving medication MUST be identified with indicator leg bands. These can be obtained at no charge from the Fair Veterinarian Office.

ALL BREEDS JUNIOR SHOWMANSHIP

ALL BREEDS JUNIOR SHOWMANSHIP RULES

The Puyallup Fair will sponsor showmanship classes for junior exhibitors involved in the Open Dairy Show. The contest, which will include junior exhibitors from all the breeds in that section, will happen once during each section of the Open Dairy Show (see schedule). Classes will be divided into four age groups.

Sign-up for the showmanship classes will take place in the Dairy Office at check-in time. Juniors participating must provide: full name, age, address.

Juniors do not need to be the registered owner of the animals used in the showmanship classes. All animals must be entered in the Open Dairy Show.

Prize Schedule #10 (pg. 25) will be used for the showmanship classes with 10th place money extended to all entrants.

In the event that there is a national or regional show where the Breed Association sponsors showmanship classes, the junior exhibitors from that breed will not be eligible for the Puyallup Fair-sponsored showmanship classes.

outside the family, cannot be used in either

- B. For an exhibitor to be eligible to show an
animal, the title of ownership of the exhibitor
shall show on the Certificate of Registry at the
time of the exhibition.
- C. As outlined in the PDCA Show ring Code of
Ethics, if a Brown Swiss Show judge should
bring to the attention of the staff possible
unethical practices related to Brown Swiss
cattle exhibited at the Show, the staff will

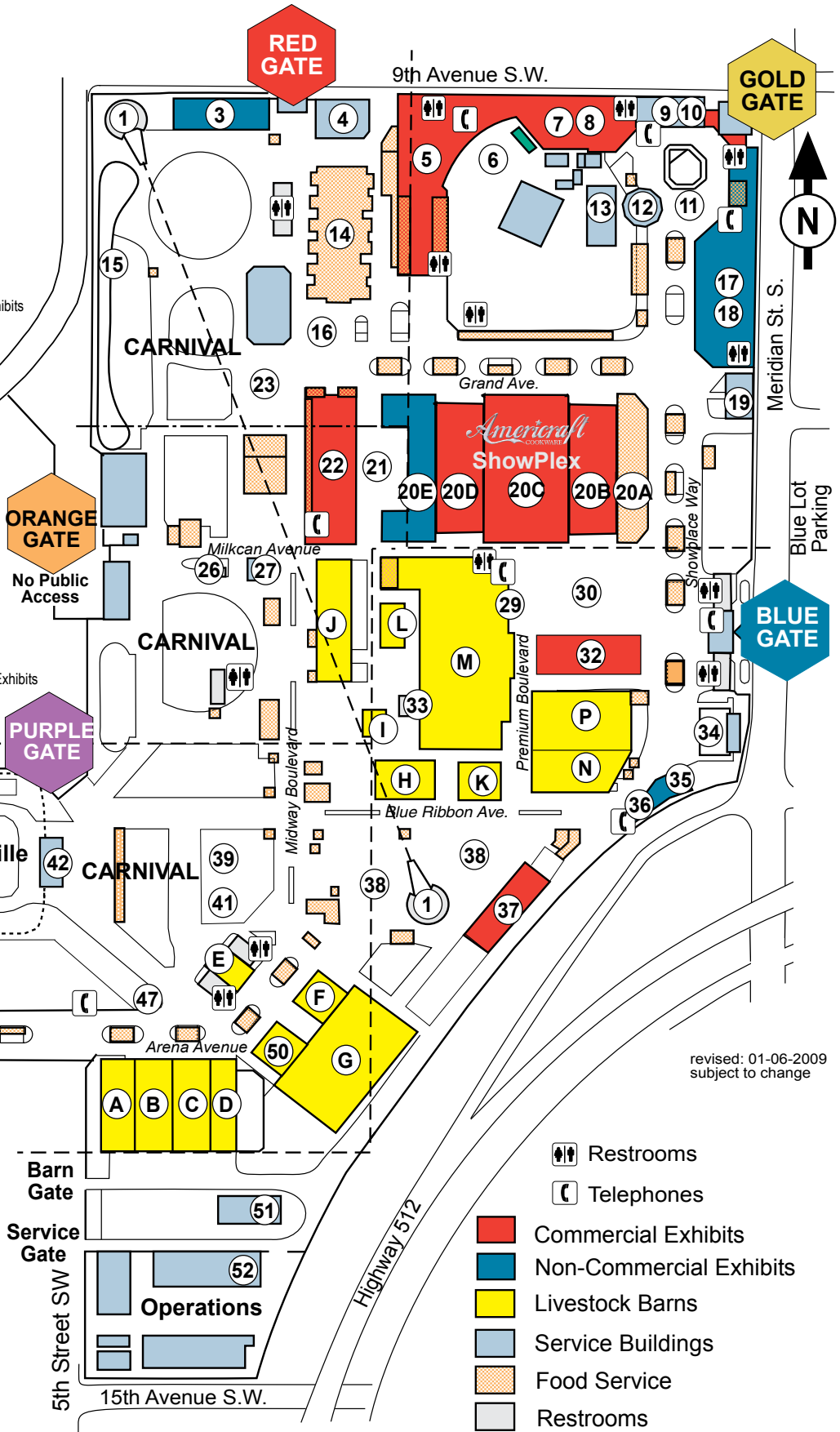
