# DEPARTMENTAL EXHIBITORS RULES AND REGULATIONS

The general supervision of the entire Puyallup Fair and Spring Fair in Puyallup, including all exhibits, entertainment and concessions, has been vested by the Western Washington Fair Association board of directors in the Chief Executive Officer of the Association.

1. The Association will have officers on the grounds and will use every reasonable precaution in its power for the preservation and protection of persons, articles on exhibition, entries, livestock and property, but will not be responsible for loss or damage by theft, fire or otherwise.

## TRADEMARKS AND COPYRIGHTS

2. Certain words, slogans and graphic symbols have been established to represent the Puyallup Fair and the Spring Fair in Puyallup, and are the exclusive property of the Western Washington Fair Association. "The Spring Fair in Puyallup" and "The Puyallup Fair" are trade names registered with Washington's Secretary of State. Artwork, slogans, music and other communications created to promote or represent the Association or its annual fairs are likewise protected by law. This includes the phrase "Do the Puyallup" and the music and lyrics of the song, "Do the Puyallup," the wordmark combining "THE SPRING FAIR IN PUYALLUP" and "THE PUYALLUP FAIR" and other temporary slogans such as "It's Spring, Baby!", "Epic Fun" or "I Love This Fair."

The valuable trade names and protected slogans and symbols may not be used without the express written consent of the Fair. In general, permission is granted under license, i.e., for consideration, or by permission under special circumstances. Submit requests to the marketing manager, along with complete information on frequency and distribution, including examples or written description of the proposed use.

WHEN ADDRESSING CORRESPONDENCE TO THE FAIR, PLEASE NOTE DEPARTMENT TO WHICH IT BELONGS ON THE FACE OF THE ENVELOPE.

3. Exhibitors should check each department for specific entry information. Read the special rules and other information printed in connection with the classification and prize list in each department. Note the time set for the closing of entries.
4. Every animal or article must be entered in the name of the owner, maker or grower.  
  
ANYONE TRYING TO DECEIVE THE COMMITTEE WITH REGARD TO OWNERSHIP OF EXHIBIT, OR WHO SHALL PURCHASE OR BORROW THEM AND EXHIBIT THEM AS OF HIS OR HER OWN MANUFACTURE OR PRODUCTION, SHALL FORFEIT ALL CLAIMS AS AN EXHIBITOR.
5. No "FOR SALE" cards will be allowed on exhibits, in the buildings, or on the grounds.
6. Fair management reserves the right to cancel any class without prior notice for reasons deemed advisable by Fair legal counsel and/or Fair veterinarian.

## ARRIVAL TIME OF EXHIBITS

7. The Puyallup Fair will be open for the receiving of articles according to the specified rules governing individual departments.
8. EXHIBITS MUST BE IN PLACE AT 8:00 A.M. THE FIRST DAY OF THE FAIR UNLESS OTHERWISE NOTED. CHECK EACH DEPARTMENT'S ENTRY INFORMATION FOR POSSIBLE EXCEPTIONS.

## PREMIUMS AND AWARDS

9. First premiums shall be designated by blue ribbons, second premiums by red ribbons, third premiums by white ribbons, fourth premiums by pink ribbons, and fifth premiums by yellow ribbons.

10. No animal or article shall be allowed to compete for more than one open class premium, nor shall it be entered in more than one class, except as one of a herd, pair or pen, fur or wool, get of sire or dam, or in sweepstakes or championship classes. However, 4-H and FFA exhibitors may also show their registered livestock in open classes, provided their entries are received by the closing date for entries in the open class, and providing there is no conflict in judging schedule with the junior show.
11. No animal or article shall be removed from the Fair before the close of the Fair or show, except by special permission from the superintendent. Any animal or article taken away before the close of the Fair or show without the permission of the superintendent shall forfeit all premiums. LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS: SEE RULES IN REGARD TO SPLIT SHOWS UNDER SPECIFIC DEPARTMENTS.
12. Unless otherwise stated by a specific department, in cases where exhibits are tied for prizes, awards shall be determined as follows:
  - A. If the premium is a trophy, medal or any other award except a cash prize, the exhibitors entering these exhibits shall draw lots, the winner being awarded the premium.
  - B. If the premium is a cash prize, the money shall be divided equally among the exhibitors concerned. The next lower cash premium, if any, offered in the class shall be added to the premium for which the entries are tied, and then the division shall be made equally.
13. Cash prizes shall be paid to winners only in classes included in the judge's list.
14. The judges shall report only the animals or articles entitled to premiums in the judge's list, though they may commend others they deem worthy. The superintendent may deny entry to any animal or exhibit he deems unworthy of public display.
15. No animal or article deemed unworthy shall be awarded a premium. No premiums shall be withheld merely because there is no competition. Decision of the judge shall be final.
16. No person shall be allowed to see the judging books until after the awards have been made and entered.

### **PENALTIES AND PROTESTS**

17. Fair management will appoint a superintendent and one or more judges for each division when deemed necessary. No person can act as a judge in any division or class in which there is any direct or indirect

interest in the result as owner or agent; and when awards have been made in violation of this rule Fair management reserves the right to appoint a new judge and to compel another examination.

18. Any person interfering with the judge during the adjudication of awards will forfeit the right of premiums. All officers or judges are required, and exhibitors are requested, to report any violation of this rule to the department superintendent.
19. All protests must be made in writing, and must be accompanied by a deposit of \$25.00, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal, and must be filed with the Puyallup Fair Entry Office within 24 hours after the cause of protest.
20. NO PERSON SHALL BE ALLOWED TO SELL OR GIVE AWAY ARTICLES ON THE GROUNDS, EITHER DURING THE FAIR OR AT ANY TIME BEFORE THE COMMENCEMENT OF THE SAME, UNTIL THE LICENSE FOR THE PRIVILEGE SHALL HAVE BEEN PAID AND RECEIPT THEREFORE ISSUED. THIS INCLUDES BALLOONS OR OTHER NOVELTIES FOR WHICH THE FAIR CONTRACTS THE SALE PRIVILEGE.

### **PERSONALITY RIGHTS**

Exhibitor hereby grants to Western Washington Fair Association ("WWFA") the irrevocable, assignable, worldwide right and license to use, alter and publish his/her image, alone or together with other images and text, for WWFA publications and for all other purposes reasonably related to promotion of WWFA, the Spring Fair in Puyallup and Puyallup Fair, in any manner and in any medium now known or later developed, without the need for exhibitor's prior approval. This right and license will govern all images of exhibitor, whether created before or after the date of these Rules and Regulations, unless exhibitor notifies WWFA in writing that of a desire to exclude specific images from this right and license. Exhibitor hereby releases the photographer and/or videographer and WWFA, its agents and assigns, from all claims and liability relating to the licenses that exhibitor has granted in this license and release. This license and release will not obligate WWFA to use or publish exhibitor's image or use the rights exhibitor has granted.

### **ELECTRICAL USAGE NOTICE**

Electrical appliances which draw more than 200 watts and which are used for the personal convenience of exhibitors (kettles, coffee pots, space heaters, air conditioners, hot plates, etc.) are not allowed without permission. A costly power failure can result from overloading circuits.

NO COOKING OR EATING IS ALLOWED IN THE BARN.

# VEHICLE UNLOADING PROCEDURES

The Puyallup Fair is continually striving to make setup of merchandise and animal exhibits safer and more efficient. We are asking for your full cooperation in this safety program. **If you do not need to drive onto the grounds, please park in a Fair parking lot and hand truck or walk in.** When you have to drive in and unload, do so as quickly as possible and exit.

## Security Check

Each vehicle entering the grounds will be subject to search prior to entering the grounds. Please enter designated Security Checkpoint Staging Area located at the Service Gate area. Expect delays.

## Service Gate

Enter to receive vehicle permit to unload on grounds. You will be allowed one hour to unload and exit the grounds. Your pass will be date/time stamped. If you absolutely cannot complete your unloading in one hour, you must get the pass validated by a department superintendent or an administrative person.

## Traffic Pattern

Follow the traffic patterns as established. Surrender the vehicle permit at the time you exit the grounds.

## Fine

If you take longer than one hour and do not have validation for an extension, there is a parking fine of \$10.00 per hour.

## During Fair Time

Concessionaires and sponsors with vehicles will be allowed through the Service Gate between 6:00 am and 8:30 am with a Service Road Vehicle Permit. You will receive your gate permit from the attendant at the gate. **NO** vehicles are allowed through the gate after 8:30 am. All vehicles must be removed from the grounds by 9:00 am. Vehicles left unattended and without a permit for parking past the allotted time will either receive a warning and be asked to remove the vehicle from the grounds or be towed away at the owner's expense. Do not park in front of doorways or in vehicle traffic lanes. Your vehicle may be towed away. **HANG VEHICLE PERMIT ON THE REAR VIEW MIRROR SO YOU CAN BE FOUND IN AN EMERGENCY. Include the building where you can be located and your cell phone number.** Please unload quickly and remove your vehicle from the grounds. **NO KEYS ARE TO BE LEFT IN MOTORIZED VEHICLES ON DISPLAY.**

# JUNIOR POULTRY VETERINARIAN INFORMATION

A health certificate is NOT required by the Puyallup Fair. The health status of entries will be ascertained at the time of entry, and will continue under the Animal Health Department's surveillance while on the grounds. All entries must be free from visible evidence of infectious, parasitic and contagious diseases when presented, and must remain so while on exhibit. No animal from a quarantined area or premises will be permitted to enter the grounds. The Fair Veterinarian will be the final authority in determination of suitability for exhibition.

Exhibitors should note and respect the potential for exposure to health threatening conditions while at the Fair. Crowding of animals and birds, long distance hauling, and changing environmental conditions are major stresses to which exhibits are subjected. Animals and birds, like humans, have the capability to become recovered carriers of viruses or other infectious agents. Exhibition-imposed stress may cause a recrudescence or reactivation with resulting outbreaks of the disease, as occurs with malaria in humans. The Fair management will do all in its power to protect exhibits while on display.

The exhibitor has important responsibilities prior to the Fair. These responsibilities should be implemented

a minimum of three weeks before entering the Fair circuit. Vaccinations must be up to date, and an effective parasite control program employed. State-of-the-art prophylactic care is strongly recommended for all animals to be exhibited.

Livestock on exhibit at the Fair are the very best of their species and breed, and must present this image to the viewing public.

## **PIGEONS / POULTRY**

A health certificate is not required by the Puyallup Fair. An inspection will take place at the Puyallup Fair when your animals arrive. Please read the general information above.

## **COMPANION ANIMALS PROHIBITED**

Animals and birds not intended for exhibition will be denied entry to the Puyallup Fair. Please leave your pet at home for its own protection, with the exception of service animals. They should be properly protected against infectious and communicable diseases as indicated for exhibit animals.

## JUNIOR POULTRY PERSON OF THE YEAR AWARD

Each year an outstanding feature of the Junior Poultry Exposition is the selection of Washington's Junior Poultry Person of the Year. Winners are chosen for outstanding performance in poultry projects, leadership, citizenship, and participation in the Junior Poultry Exposition. The winner will receive \$100 cash. The entry form (page 24) must be turned in with your Master Entry Form.

### ELIGIBILITY

Vocational Agriculture students (FFA) must be regularly enrolled in poultry project work with the state supervisor of agricultural education, and must own and manage

poultry to be exhibited for at least 60 days before the show. Members of a 4-H Club must be regularly enrolled in a poultry project with the Washington State University Extension, and must own and manage the poultry to be exhibited for at least 60 days before the show.

If all entries are not deemed of high enough quality, the award does not have to be given.

# RULES AND REGULATIONS

## IMPORTANT NOTICE TO POULTRY AND PIGEON EXHIBITORS

Avian influenza is a highly contagious viral disease among all species of birds. Our exhibitors should be advised that the scheduled 2009 Poultry and Pigeon shows may be cancelled if conditions warrant. In the event of a cancellation, entry fees, if applicable, will be refunded.

### Exhibitors:

1. During the Fair, ALL vehicles must be off the grounds by 9 am or the vehicle will be towed.
2. All entry cards must be in the Junior Poultry manager's office by August 31, 2009. **No late entries will be accepted.** The show reserves the right to limit entries. Any bill due to the Exposition will be paid before prize money is paid, or will be taken from premiums. Otherwise, exhibitors won't be permitted to show next year until their account is settled.
3. All poultry exhibits must be delivered to the Exposition at the Puyallup Fair between 6:30 am and 9 am on Thursday, September 24, 2009. Late entries will not be accepted. Use the Service Gate on 5th Street SW, off of 15th Avenue SW.
4. The Exposition suggests that no more than four birds are put in a crate. Allow plenty of ventilation.
5. Each crate must have a solid bottom and have clean bedding to protect the appearance of the entry. **SOILED OR DIRTY BIRDS WILL BE REJECTED BY SHOW MANAGEMENT. Crates must be removed from the grounds** or they will be disposed of by show management.
6. All exhibitors attending the show must be responsible to a high school agriculture instructor or a 4-H leader. Other interested youth must be responsible to an adult.
7. Instructors and leaders are responsible for the completion and accuracy of entry form. Exhibitors must fill out a master form for each entry. Improper or incomplete entries will be disqualified. Entries will be judged as entered.
8. 4-H Club members and FFA members will not compete against each other, unless there are not five entries in a class/group.
9. Birds must be owned or managed by the exhibitor at least 60 days prior to the show, and must be entered by breed, variety, and sex.
10. All birds must be properly banded before they are delivered to the Poultry Building. If you have any old bands or bands on your birds, you may use them. Bands may be purchased at the show for \$1.00 each.
11. An exhibitor will enter only as 4-H, FFA, or other interested youth.
12. Due to cage limitations, the same bird cannot compete in two divisions. Fryer contest birds are only eligible for exhibit in the commercial division. Exhibitors will be limited to a total of 25 birds. There will be a limit of 800 birds in the show.
13. Due to the limited number of available 10x10 outside pens, exhibitors showing large fowl may be limited to one pen on a first come, first serve basis. The manager will contact those exhibitors who have NOT been assigned a pen.
14. Sifting committees will inspect all exhibits for proper entry. All birds must pass disease and parasite inspection by veterinarians upon arrival and during the show. Inspect your birds! Clean birds are YOUR responsibility. Diseased birds and birds with lice or mites will be rejected. Dust your birds 14 days before the show. The show management or vet will deny entry to any animal or exhibit they deem unworthy for public display.
15. **All exhibitors must do fitting and showing, plus at least two hours of birdsmanship during the show to receive premiums. Showing the public your passion for birds and the project is encouraged.**
16. The Exposition will provide feed and proper care. Feed is the property of Land-O-Lakes Western Feed Division and the Puyallup Fair. It is not to be removed from the grounds.
17. Hybrids developed for laying purposes can be entered in the commercial class.
18. All entries will be accepted with the understanding that neither the show organization, nor the Puyallup Fair or their officers shall be held responsible for any damage or loss that may arise to poultry and other exhibits on exhibition.
19. Bantams described in American Standard of Perfection or American Bantam Association Standard will be allowed. **NO HYBRIDS OR CROSSES.**
20. Birds must be removed by exhibitor. The Exposition suggests that birds be quarantined for 14 days before re-entering home flocks to eliminate possibility of introducing diseases to home flocks.
21. No sales will be permitted in the Poultry Barn, nor will "FOR SALE" cards be permitted on cages or on Puyallup Fair property.
22. Conflict Resolution must be followed in the order listed below.

- a. Exhibitor will meet with the show manager (may have parent/guardian present).
  - b. Parent/guardian will meet with show manager with exhibitor present.
  - c. Exhibitor with parent/guardian meets with show manager and a member of manager's board.
  - d. Exhibitor may write a "Letter of Protest". See Penalties and Protests on page 2 of this premium book.
23. No eggs will be allowed to remain in cages or be saved.

**24. INSTRUCTIONS TO JUDGES:**

- a. All standard egg production breeds will be entered in Commercial class and judged on basis of production. Such birds may be dubbed or beaks trimmed. All meat breeds will be graded in USDA grades. Turkey, duck and goose classes shall be judged by the American Standard of Perfection and USDA grades. All birds, excluding Commercial class, pigeons and miscellaneous, must be classified according to American Standard of Perfection or American Bantam Standard.
- b. The judge may consider an entry not worthy of an award.
- c. The following will be considered as a basis of disqualification from show:
  - 1) Improper fitting of entry (exception: Primary and secondary feathers of one wing may be clipped to prevent flight).
  - 2) Incomplete or improper entry.
  - 3) Diseased birds.
  - 4) External parasites.
  - 5) Serious deformities such as crooked neck, deformed beak or humpback.
  - 6) Breeds not listed in American Standard of Perfection or American Bantam Standard.
  - 7) Large Fowl Rumpless Araucana will be judged by A.P.A. standard. Tailed Araucana in Large Fowl will be classified as non-standard. Bantam Araucana will be judged by the latest A.B.A. standard.

# SHELL EGG EXHIBITS

## SCORE CARD EXPLANATION

1. Weight per dozen: Jumbo-30 oz.; Extra Large-27 to 29 oz.; Large-24 to 26 oz.; Medium-21 to 23 oz.; Small-18 to 20 oz.; Pee Wee- 15 oz. Two percent will be cut for each ounce the dozen is over or under weight for the lot in which it is entered.
2. Uniformity of weight: One percent will be cut for each egg varying more than 1/2 oz. per dozen from the average weight of the dozen.
3. Uniformity of shape and shell texture: Eggs should be oval and tapered, about 1-1/2 times as long as they are thick. Shells should be of smooth texture, free from lime spots, wrinkles or ridges. A cut of 1/4 to 1-1/2 percent will be made for each egg off shape or showing defects. The size of the cut will be dependent upon the extent of the shape and the seriousness of the shell defects.
4. Cleanliness: Eggs should be clean. Eggs that show cleaning scratches will be cut the same as dirty eggs. A cut of 1/4 to 1 percent will be made for each egg showing scratches or dirty spots. Eggs showing excessive oil or other treatment on the shell will be cut 1/4 to 1 percent. The size of the cut will be dependent upon the seriousness of the defect.
5. Uniformity of Color: If white, the shell must be chalky white, free from creamy color. There should be no cream or tinted eggs. If brown, they may be any shade as long as they are uniform. 1/4 to 1/2 percent cut will be made for each egg off color. The size of the cut will be dependent upon the seriousness of the defects.

## CANDLING CONDITION

1. Shell Quality: Shells should be sound, free from blind checks, not showing porousness, mottling or weak spots. A cut of 1/4 to one percent will be made for each egg showing a defect. The size of the cut will be dependent upon the seriousness of the defects.
2. Air Cells: Contents should nearly fill the shell. The air space should be no larger than a dime. Floating air cells are a defect, as are air cells placed other than at the large end of the egg. A cut of 1/4 to 1 percent will be made for each egg showing any defects. The size of the cut will be dependent upon the seriousness of the defects.
3. Interior Quality: The yolk should be dimly visible, centrally located and move slowly. The white should appear clear, firm, light in color and it should be thick as determined by the slow movement of the yolk. A cut of 1/4 to 2 percent will be made for each egg showing these defects. The size of the cut will be dependent upon the seriousness of the defects.

## DISQUALIFICATIONS

An egg will be disqualified if cracked or for showing blood, meat spots, black rot, rots, and stuck yolks. One or more eggs disqualified do not affect the balance of the entry. A cut of seven percent will be made for each egg disqualified.

## PIGEON, WATERFOWL AND POULTRY, 4-H AND FFA SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST

Jr. Poultry Showmanship will be Saturday, September 26 starting at 9 am AFTER all birds in the Poultry Barn are fed, watered and groomed. 4-H Seniors will start, followed by Intermediates, then Juniors, followed by Primaries. FFA exhibitors will follow 4-H. FFA show order: Graduate, Senior and Novice.

Exhibitors must show their own live bird exhibits. Pigeons will be allowed this year. Exhibitors must show breed and leg band numbers on the judging form.

Ducks will be judged under the regular Poultry Fitting and Showmanship, unless seven or more are entered in an age group (except that a separate nomenclature test for Ducks will be given).

The participants will line up with their poultry, pigeon or duck. The judge will look over each contestant for neatness and general appearance, then ask each individual to take their bird out of the cage, then place it back in the cage. He may ask the youth the names of various parts of the fowl, including how to check the width and condition of the breast, pubic bones and abdomen. He may ask the contestant questions and/or to repeat the procedure.

The Showmanship Contest will be held behind the Poultry Barn.

All birds used in the Showmanship Contest must be entered by the exhibitor who is using them, with the exception of the manager's permission. Individuals not abiding by this rule will lose all premium points and awards.

### Appearance of Youth:

4-H - Clean, neat, white, long-sleeved shirt or blouse, and black pants or skirt.

FFA - Official FFA dress. Jewelry may be down graded.

All 4-H and FFA showmanship exhibitors will be judged as individuals, and as such, will compete against all other contestants of the same age group for awards, both

cash and ribbons. Participants will be allowed to do each poultry, pigeon and duck fitting and showing. Ducks will be judged by Dr. Daniel Andrew's Guidelines for Fitting and Showmanship of Ducks, 1989. Pigeons will be judged under Puget Sound Pigeon Club rules.

**EDUCATIONAL DISPLAYS**

Posters, Charts, Graphs, Mobiles, Educational Displays

Posters, charts, graphs, mobiles and educational displays will be delivered to the Fair on September 21 between 6 am and 9 am.

Educational and promotional posters are to promote poultry products, or to inform the public about poultry or the science related to poultry, and must be of an educational nature.

Posters should answer the questions they pose.

The size may range from small posters to 4' x 4' educational displays. The display may include sound, motion, etc. Posters must be readable from a distance of 10 feet.

Posters will be judged on: Design - 40 points; Originality and Creativity - 20 points; and Educational Value - 40 points.

Entries will be prepared by the individual. Professional help is not allowed, although classroom aid by school art teachers is permissible. You are free to use any materials to portray your interest. Materials used in a previous year may not be reused.

You may enter one item in each lot, and it must be labeled on the back, including: Lot, Name, Year, Age. Displays will be disqualified without this information.

Posters, charts, graphs, mobiles and educational displays with misspelled words will be disqualified.

### SUGGESTIONS FOR EDUCATIONAL DISPLAYS

Displays should educate quickly:

- A. Simplicity is essential - be clear and concise.
- B. Lettering should be large enough to read from a 10-foot distance.
- C. Should have a single dominant theme.

Be creative:

- A. Be ingenious in your use of materials in presentation or subject manner.
- B. Be creative in your use of color and lettering.
- C. Tell your story accurately, but interestingly.
- D. Actively involve the viewer.

Get the message across:

- A. Be specific, rather than general.
- B. All information should be pertinent and of interest.
- C. Too much information loses attention and becomes confusing.

4. 4-H trophies will be awarded to the five highest scoring individuals in each division - Junior, Intermediate and Senior. Blue 80%-100%= 20 points, Red 65%-79%= 15 points, white 50%-64%= 10 points. Individual scores below 50% of the highest possible score will receive no award.

# BIRDSMANSHIP

## CLASS

### B BIRDSMANSHIP

This required program gives individuals additional responsibility in the Exposition, offering an educational experience while meeting the public. **All exhibitors must do a two-hour shift of Birdsmanship or their premiums will be withheld.**

**Each shift requires four students, plus a parent, leader or instructor.** If a group does not have an adult to participate, notify the Exposition manager. Shifts are: 8 am - 10 am, 10 am - noon, noon - 2 pm, 2 pm - 4 pm, 4 pm - 6 pm, 6 pm - 8 pm, and 8 pm - 10 pm.

Birdsmanship entries must be in the Exposition office by August 31, 2009. The first four individuals to request a shift and have their entry cards into the Exposition office will be assigned to that shift.

## BIRDSMANSHIP DUTIES

1. Check in at the beginning of your duty period with the office person in charge of birdsmanship. Each person is responsible for signing in and out, including the parent, leader or instructor.
2. Wear an apron and a birdsmanship badge with your name on it to identify yourself to the public and others as the person on birdsmanship duty.
3. Actively patrol the Poultry Barn or the area that is assigned to your care. Your duties will include feeding, watering, cleaning cages, putting fresh shavings in cages or pens, keeping the floor and building looking in top shape (but not putting anyone's eye out with a broom handle), candling eggs at the table (or area for this project), or any other duties given you by the staff of the Washington Junior Poultry Exposition or board person. Sitting down, socializing, etc. is not actively patrolling. If there is no one at the candling table and your work is done in your assigned area, come to the office and ask if you can show people eggs or be given a different job. There may be only one person at the candling table at a time.

4. While patrolling, perform the following duties:
  - Talk to the public. Tell them about the poultry on display or the poultry that they are viewing. It is vital to give them accurate information. Try to answer any questions they may have about poultry or the group you come from (4-H or FFA). Offer information or take them to the Exposition office for help in answering their questions. Don't wait for them to ask. A suggested approach is to say, "I'm on barn duty. If there is anything I can tell you about our poultry, feel free to ask me."
  - Gently inform the public that they shouldn't stick their fingers or anything else into the cages because it upsets the poultry and they may get hurt. If they would like to pet a baby chick, recommend they visit the Fair Farm, or, if available, to the area the Exposition has set up for this.
  - Pick up litter (put it in the right place), stray tack, fallen or eaten cage cards, etc. and put them where they belong. If new cards are needed, come to the office for help. No personal belongings should be left sitting around the Poultry Barn. When these are found, bring them to the Exposition office so we can find the owner.
  - Watch the poultry for any sign of distress or sickness. If you think there is a problem, notify the office. Pick up any eggs that may have been laid, unless there is a problem.
  - Keep feed and water in front of the animals at all times. Keep water dishes full and feed dishes 3/4 full.
5. Do not remove any animals from cages or from the barn unless the manager gives their approval.  
Do not eat or drink while on duty.  
Do not be rude to the public or anyone else. We are here for them. It is your show, but remember that we are at the Puyallup Fair, and one of their guests.
6. At the end of your shift, check out with the office, return your birdsmanship badge and apron, and sign out. Remember to return your tools so the next shift can find them. Also remember that the pliers belong to the Exposition or the Puyallup Fair, so be sure to return them.
7. If you can do more birdsmanship, it would be great. Remember, you must do at least two hours during the show.

#### CONDUCT:

Good sportsmanship, manners and language are expected. Judges' decisions are final.

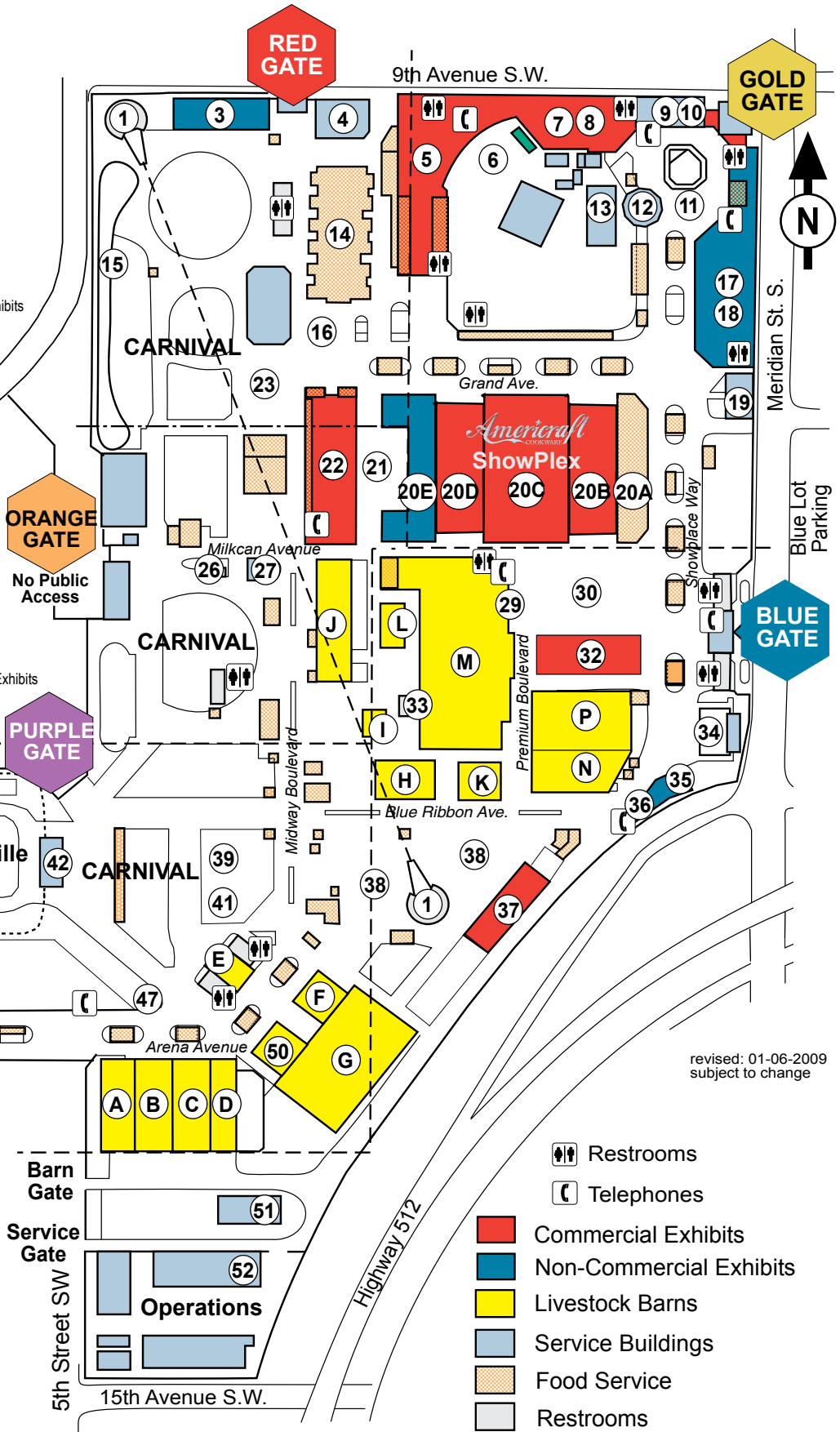
